

# Detroit Beats New York: Unbeaten in Seven Games

Detroit (AP)—Detroit Red Wings extended their unbeaten streak to seven games and took away sole possession of first place in the National Hockey League with a 5-1 victory over New York Rangers Thursday night.

A power-play goal by Norm Ullman in the second period put the Red Wings ahead to stay. Floyd Smith opened the scoring for Detroit late in the first period and Bruce MacGregor got the insurance goal midway in the final period.

It was the fourth goal in three games for MacGregor, who did not score a point in the Red Wings' first six games.

Dick Duff scored New York's second goal, which tied the score in the second period. He beat Roger Crozier, who had 22 saves, after the Detroit goaltender stopped Bob Nev's backhand shot.

Ullman's winning goal came some 44 seconds after New York's Vic Hadfield had been sent off for high sticking in a 12-5. Smith put the puck over Marcel Paille, down after stopping a shot by Alex Delvecchio from close in.

The Red Wings, who dropped their first two games this season, have had six victories and a tie in their last seven outings.

**HUNTER'S CORNER**  
**Even Old Hunters Are On Edge When Geese Are Near**  
The pulse stirring music of a geese honking in the sky is heard again in the land. When a flock of the big black and white geese is on the wing, there is a 'rig' of decoys set out on stubble, with their big black feet flying in a landing. It gives the old time goose hunters that tingly feeling all over their bodies. One old hunter described it is that "all over ailer in patches feeling" it really stirs ones blood and sends it coursing wildly through ones veins.

It also saves a lot of geese. Many hunters just throw their guns to their shoulders, point in the general direction of the incoming geese and pull the trigger. There is a lot of space between geese. They may look crowded and congested but it is anything but. They have to allow space for wing spread and that plenty.

Geese are changing their tactics with respect to stubble feeding. There was a time when one could set his traps as to their feeding time. Generally a half hour after daybreak one could hear the honkers out on all water getting restless and it would be a short wait for the first of their arrival. Many flocks have got in the habit of night feeding. Last year farmers reported hearing geese passing overhead near the witching hour of midnight and, shortly before daybreak in the "h-bits" blackens" it really stirs ones blood and sends it coursing wildly through ones veins.

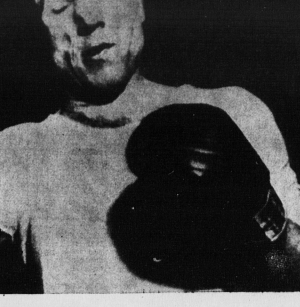
