## School Observes Red Cross Week

TIGNISH — "Red Cross work is a character builder. It calls for forgetfulness of self and consideration for the welfare of our neighbors in all parts of the world", Gerard Doucette, president of the Junior Red Cross organization at Tignish regional high, told the student body at the Junior Red Cross assembly meeting. He urged them to become involved in the problems of other people at home and abroad in an attempt to draw the peoples of the world together in charity and good-will.

The meeting, the highlight of school activities for Red Cross Week, was opened by singing the Red Cross Song and the recitation of the Red Cross Pledge. The president then welcomed the guest speaker, Mrs. W. W. Reid, director of Junior Red Cross for Prince Edward Island. The minutes of the last meeting, the report of the treasurer, reports of the individual classes, report of the School Project Committee, the report of the recently formed camera club committee were read and adopted.

Mrs. Reid was then called on to present the winners of the interclass Red Cross essay contest with their awards. They were: Marion Shea, grade 12; Brenda Gavin, grade 10; and Carol Anne Perry, grade 9. Mrs.

Reid was then presented with a cheque of \$50 contributions to the Stamp Out Hunger drive, to the purchase of teen-manuals for Latin America, and to the fund for needy children.

Bernard Touseard introduced the new project, the Wheeler Dealer which is now in full swing. This is an attempt to raise sufficient money for the purchase of a wheel chair which the students will present to their own community May 8 through the Red Cross. Other new business of the meeting centered around the first aid kit which the students will present to the sports section of the high school.

Mr. Harper, physical education instructor, urged the students to make this themselves rather than buy one ready made.

The essay contest winners then gave a short talk each.

Mrs. Reid, in her address, congratulated the students for their fine spirit of co-operation and their great achievements in Red Cross work. "Many people think that the Red Cross is a money making organization," she said, "but you people really have the right slant on things as was shown by your essays and other projects explained here this morning."

She urged the students to keep up the good work. Mrs. Reid then showed slides on the various projects carried out by Red Cross in countries such as Hong Kong, Lebanon and the Sudan.

Also three sisters, Mrs. Myers, Mrs. Cyril Perry of Charlottetown, R.I.; Mrs. Joseph E. Gallant, Nail Pond, also two brothers Tom and Michael Bernard; Nail Pond, and 14 grandchildren.

The largely attended funeral was held Tuesday morning from the home of her son, Edgar, to St. Simon and St. Jude Church. Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Clare MacDonald who also officiated at the grave. Very Rev. M. J. Rooney was in the sanctuary.

One section of the report dealt with this province's loss of qualified teachers to other provinces.

## OTHERS GET BENEFIT

It was recommended that representation be made to Ottawa to recognize the fact that other provinces are getting the benefit of qualified teachers educated in this province and a request be made that the federal government "compensate us for the demand made on our limited revenues to continue to finance this valuable export of teaching personnel."

The committee also recommended that the government implement a new salary scale suggested by the P.E.I. Teacher's Federation "before any expenditure is incurred on the contemplated consolidation of elementary schools."

The final recommendation was that the government "enlist the services of a tax expert to work out a formula covering the equitable distribution of the education tax burden on rural and urban populations."

Mr. Grindlay objected to Mr. Matheson's criticism of the committee report, pointing out that one opposition member of the committee did not attend any committee meetings while another opposition member sat in on a meeting "for about half an hour."

## Only 5 Cases In City Court

## Fraud Case Is Dismissed

Magistrate James B. Johnston QC, dismissed the case against John Daniel MacPherson, 286 Grafton St., in Magistrate's Court yesterday morning.

MacPherson was charged with fraud but Crown Prosecutor Alan K. Scales made a motion for withdrawal of the information.

Blythe Murray, 61 St. Peter's Road, pleaded not guilty to a charge of illegal parking on the highway. Cst. Harvey Ings of the Parkdale Police was called as a witness for the crown and Mr. Murray was called by his lawyer, John Holmes, for the defence.

Magistrate Johnston after hearing the evidence found the accused guilty as charged and fined him \$10 and costs.

One man pleaded guilty to being intoxicated and was fined \$10 and costs.

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## Trust Company In Summerside To Incorporate

Approval in principle was given in the Legislature yesterday to an act incorporating the Sovereign Trust and Loan Company.

The bill incorporates G. Bruce MacDonald, George R. McMahon and Neil MacLeod, all of Summerside.

Head office of the company is to be in Summerside and the authorized capital stock of the company is to be \$100,000, divided into 1,000 shares of a par value of \$100 each.

Promoter of the bill was Alex Campbell (L-rth Prince).

## Judicare Act Read 2nd Time

A bill to amend the Judicare Act was given second reading in the Legislature yesterday.

The bill, promoted by Attorney-General M.A. Farmer, includes regulations concerning support by a husband of his wife and children upon dissolution of a marriage.
