The three are Hal Connolly, the world record holder in the 16 lb. hammer event, his wife, the pretty Czechoslovakian medical student

who beat out the Russian world record holder in the discus throw and Tom Courtney, the world champion in the 800 meter dash.

### Black Hood, Leather Gloves Wilful Damage Case Exhibits

A black hood and a pair of leather gloves were exhibits tendered in evidence yesterday at a trial in Summerside Police Court in which a young Summerside man charged with wilfully damaging property, was fined \$50 and costs or one month in jail, and \$5 for damages done to property or an additional 10 days in jail, for an incident about 1:30 a.m. Sunday morning when an apartment at 121 St. George Street was broken into by the Air Force Wing Association rooms in the Journal Building. He was allowed until June 22nd to pay the fine.

A second young Summerside man, charged in connection with the same incident, had his case dismissed for lack of evidence to provide positive identification of

the accused at the scene of the offence. In dismissing the charge, however, the Magistrate directed that a charge be laid against this man for being intoxicated in a public place, and on this charge he was convicted and fined \$20 and costs or 20 days in jail.

When Magistrate E. H. Strong allowed time, in this case, in which to pay the fine, Chief of Police, Peter R. White objected, stating that the accused had not paid a previous fine recently imposed in police court. The Magistrate ruled, however, that time would be allowed in which the fine could be paid.

The charge of causing wilful damage to property was laid following the arrest of the two men a few minutes after a window had been broken in the Air Force Wing Association rooms in the Journal Building about 1:30 a.m. Sunday morning. The manager, Mr. Victor Sanderson, happened to be working in the vault at the time, and with no lights showing the building appeared to be vacant.

Mr. Sanderson, investigating the sound of the breaking window, saw two men outside the window and immediately recognized one of them.

Both men fled the scene when he appeared, and the man he recognized, together with another Summerside man, were arrested at a Summerside restaurant a few minutes later, and a police search of the area led to the discovery of a pair of leather gloves rolled up in a black cloth face mask which also revealed some hairs which were similar in identity with the distinctive color of hair of the accused.

In one other case before the court a 16-year-old Summerside youth charged in connection with several recent breaks in Summerside, was remanded for trial until this morning.

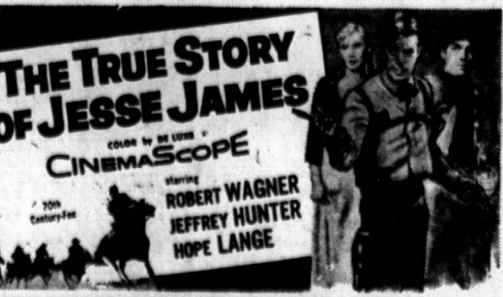
