WINS HIGH HONORS. — Mr. Craswell Portrait Photographer of this city has received word recently that he had three portraits of his own work hung at Kansas City, two at Rochester, N. Y., and four in London, England. The Kansas City Convention was that of the Professional Photographers Association of America International, and portraits from America as well as European Portrait Photographers work were submitted for the Jury of Selection. All portraits had to be A. 1. and had to be passed before a Jury of Selection, and only the portraits that were of the highest standard were accepted and hung. Craswell sent four portraits and three were selected. This Convention is the largest in America, and to have portraits hung is the highest honor that can be conferred on a photographer. Rochester and London are also big exhibitors, and to have portraits at these hung is an honor. We heartily congratulate Mr. Craswell not only upon the exceptional excellence of his art as a photographer but also upon the high recognition he has won from notable judges in the world's great cities.

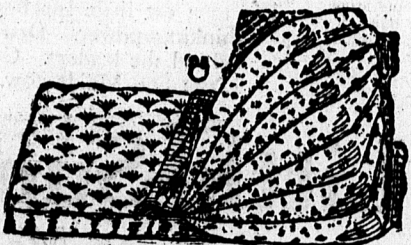

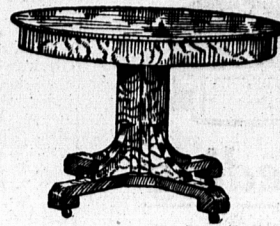
