Morell And Peakes Are Off To Winning Start

Morell and Peakes, top teams in the King's County Baseball League last year, are again proving themselves hard to beat. Morell blasted Georgetown 11-3 while Peakes bombed Souris 14-2 in the opening games of the 1958 season.

Last year, these two teams battled it out for top place with the rest of the teams trailing. After two games it looks like it might be a battle between these same two teams. However, Mount Stewart, idle last Sunday, will make its 1958 debut in Souris this Sunday against the St. Mary's. In the other game Peakes goes to Morell.

Both these games should be terrific battles. Morell and Peakes dominated the league last year. They met in the finals with Morell winning a bitterly contested series. Both have gotten off to a good start this season, and since Sunday's game help decide first place it should be quite a battle.

Last year, both Souris and Mount Stewart were homeless. All their home games had to be played on other diamonds. Both these teams now have their diamonds ready for the coming season. Sunday's game will mark the first game in Souris after a year's absence.

The schedule released in the press scheduled Georgetown to visit Peakes on June 6th. This was a misprint, and Georgetown will play in Souris on that date. The schedule will conclude on July 27th with the playoffs beginning immediately to decide a winner to advance in Island playdowns.

Turning to bowling, it looks like the King's County Bowling Championship may become a reality. Both winners in Morell and St. Peter's have informed the Souris winners that they are very definitely interested in such a roll off. If arrangements can be completed, such a roll off will occur in the St. Mary's Parish Hall Alleys in Souris on Wednesday of next week.

Jimmy Bryan Is Favorite In Indianapolis Classic

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Jimmy Bryan, a throttle-tromping demerol driver from Arizona, seems the driver of destiny in what may be the fastest "500" ever over the Indianapolis motor speedway's famed "brickyard" today.

The usual 150,000 witnesses will be on hand, in both picnic and Roman circus mood as death lurks around every turn. When the 33 fastest drivers in speedway history respond to track president Tom Hulman's command at 11:32 a.m., EDT "gentlemen, start your engines," Bryan will be purring in the third row.

But this 31-year-old racer from Phoenix, making his seventh Memorial Day race start, is driving the horizontal—engineled Belton Special which won the 500 last year from Sam Hanks. Bryan finished third last year.

In this roaring, 200-lap test around the 2½-mile brick and asphalt track Bryan must overhaul some pretty good drivers and some pretty snappy cars. Fair and warm weather is predicted.

POST POSITION In post position is the 11 rows of three cars per row in the first turn in Miami's Dick Rathmann in a McNamara Special

which set a qualifying record of 145.974 m.p.h. Completing the first row are Ed Elisian, Oakland, Calif., who set a one-lap mark of 146.508; and Jimmy Reece, Indianapolis, both driving Zink Specials.

The second row includes the only former champion entered, Johnnie Parsons of Van Nuys, Calif., winner of the 1950 rain-shortened race, driving a flat-engine Gerhardt.

Bryan certainly has the know-how to master the "brickyard" and the field which includes eight rookies. Winner of the United States Auto Club big car ailes three of the last four years, Bryan won the first 70-mile race at Monza, Italy, last year.

Last year's 500 winner, the 43-year-old Hanks will be on the sidelines watching, as director of racing for the speedway, for the likely shattering of the race record of 135.601 m.p.h. set last Memorial Day.

Driving skill is one thing, but durability of the little mechanized thoroughbred which snarl through lap after lap is another. Last year, only 17 of the 33 starters finished.

Another prime factor in the mad chase to nowhere is the swiftness and astute timing of pit stops.

Marv Throneberry, a rookie from Denver Bears, has been playing first base since Skowron was injured.

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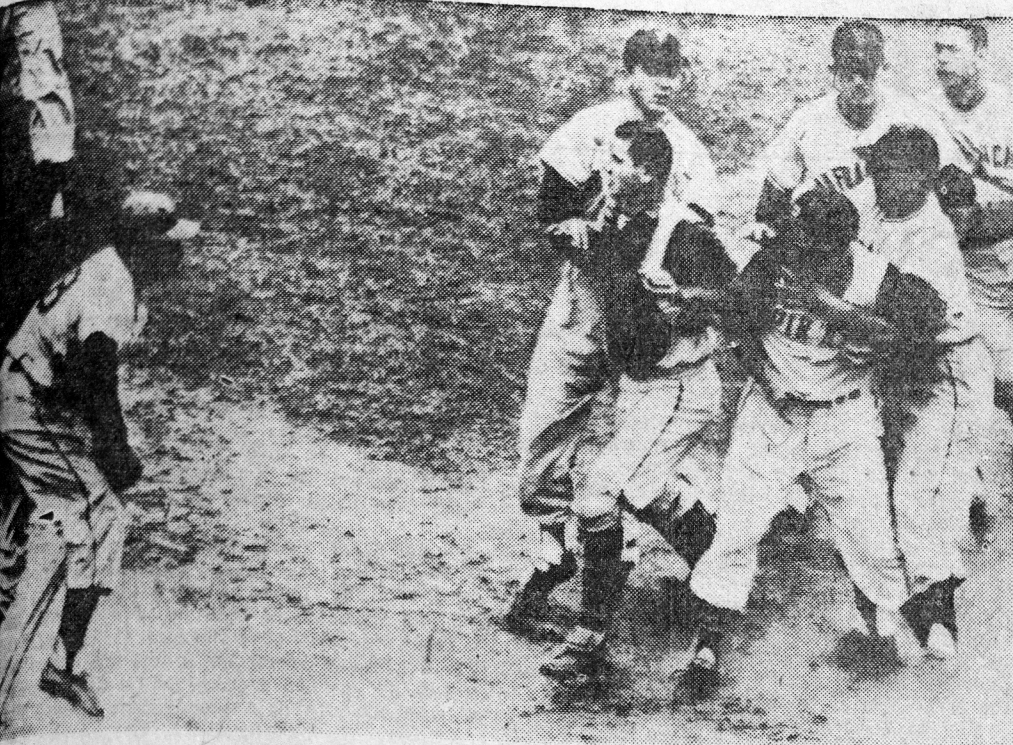
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DUSTER DUEL DOESN'T FAZE GIANTS
