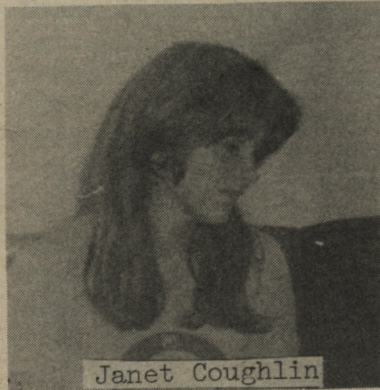

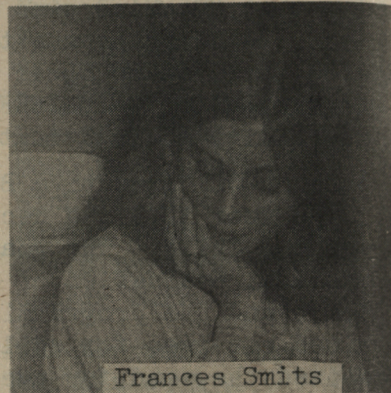
Janet Coughlin Senior

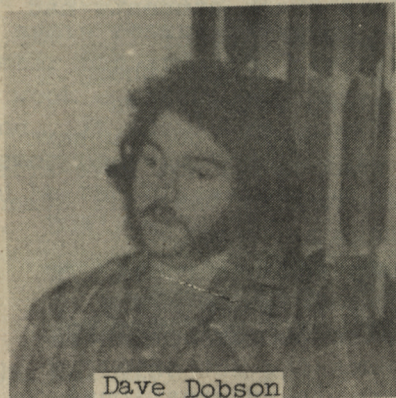

It should be interesting if it goes well and enough students become involved in it. It will only be as good as the participation in it.



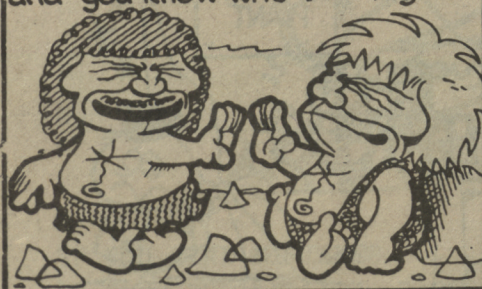
OPEN READINGS CONTINUE

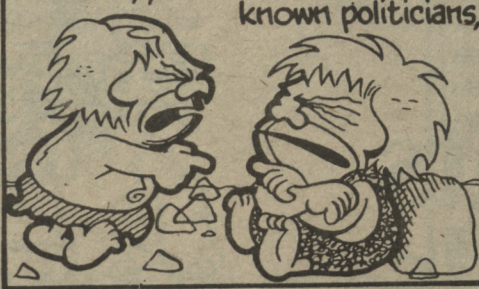
