Moore With Toronto

Dickie Moore, the famed star of the Montreal Canadiens for many years was one of the top left wingers in the National Hockey League, retired from the hockey scene last year. Moore, 32, scored 202 goals and 396 assists in 796 league and playoff games while performing in the N.H.L. George "Punch" Imlach, Toronto Maple Leafs, manager-coach, claimed Moore for the Toronto club when the Canadiens failed to protect his high scoring winger in the annual league draft. Moore, who has since done his best to make himself turn out with the Leafs, up until last week when Dickie reported to the Leafs' camp at Peterborough, Ontario. Imlach spent several weeks negotiating with the Montreal star before Dickie's arrival at training camp.

Moore had suffered a knee injury as a result of an industrial accident and was still on crutches when Imlach's camp first got underway. The knee is apparently all right as Moore has decided to face on the blades. Dickie was quoted as saying he felt he had to see if he still had the ability to perform in hockey's greatest league.

Moore had Mr. Imlach and the Toronto organization are making a mistake with their practice of picking up players who have played the best part of their career with another club and have maybe one or two good years of hockey left. "Punch" has made a practice of taking players who have been considered to be over the hill and give the player a chance to prove his club was wrong; by performing in a Maple Leaf uniform.

There will be no doubt that Imlach has produced a winning combination with this practice. We will grant this much, but we think that the Toronto hockey club has been taking a very short range view on things. They have spent many years building up a farm system which has blossomed in the business. The Toronto Marlbors captured the Memorial Cup last year and it's not too many years ago since St. Michael's hockey club owned the coaching. Dave Bauer was leading it over the Canadian junior "A" circuit.

How long will this practice continue to blossom if the parent club continues to pick up veteran campaigners, from the other clubs, to give them one last whirl in the big time? We do not know what it takes. We feel that the practice is continued that the up and coming prospects will not want to have anything to do with Imlach and company. They will want to go to the junior leagues where they are in the Toronto system with the dream of making the Leafs when the time comes. They are trying to give them the best of one of the minor leagues while a position in the majors may have been able to hold down a veteran from another club.

They don't take long for a farm system to be destroyed, when the players are not satisfied, but it takes a lot longer time and a lot of money to rebuild one. We feel that if the Leafs don't change this practice they will find themselves at the bottom of the National Hockey League in the not too distant future. The Toronto organization and a hockey player needs a good set of limbs under him if he is going to perform his job efficiently. The Detroit Red Wings and Montreal Canadiens have been giving many of their junior prospects a good chance at making the parent club and we feel that it will not be long before we see one of these teams taking over as the top team in the National Hockey League.

Griffith Floors Curvis In World Ch'ship Battle

LONDON (AP) — Ernie Griffith, New York - based world welterweight champion from the Virgin Islands, floored British champion Brian Curvis three times Tuesday night and easily retained his title on points over 15 rounds.
Griffith put Curvis down for a count of eight in the sixth round with a blow to the body and put the British and British Empire champion on the canvas again with a looping left to the jaw for a count of nine in the 11th.
Curvis went down for another count of nine in the 13th round from a right to the stomach. Both fighters weighed 145½ lbs. Associated Press card gave nine rounds to Griffith, four to Curvis and the other two were drawn.
The 26-year-old Griffith quickly conquered the right hand lead of Curvis, a southpaw, and forced the fight right from the start.
