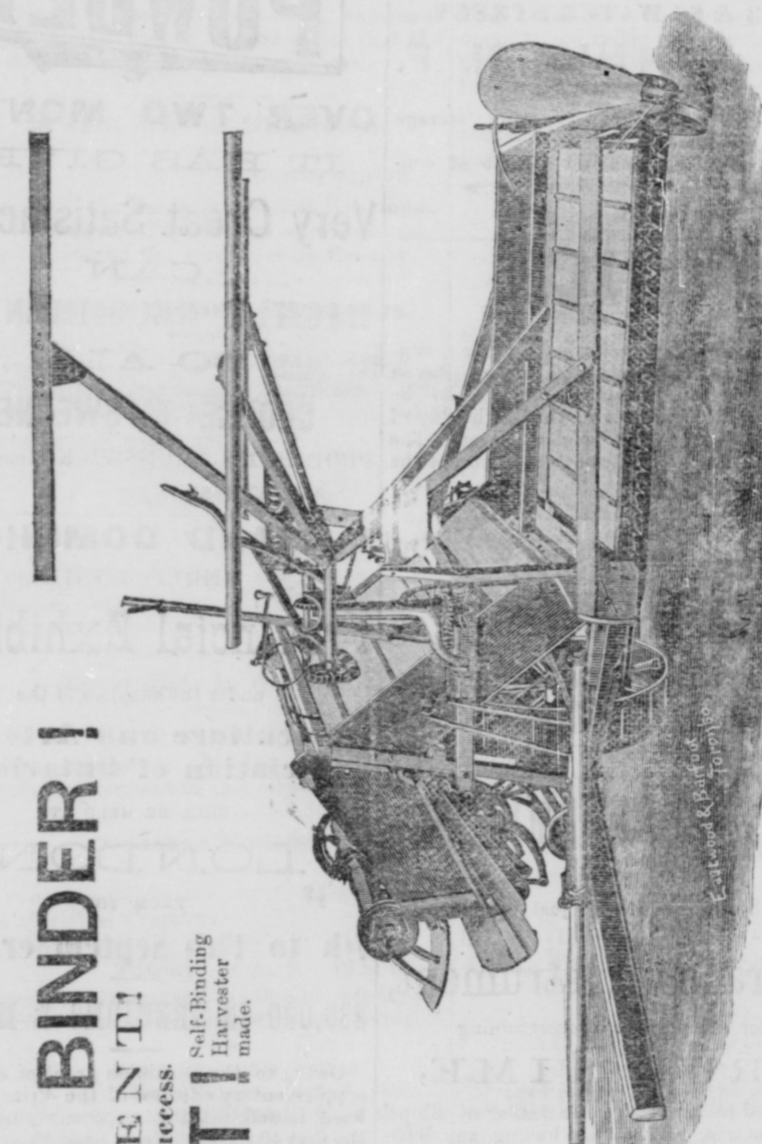

The Owners of the C. P. R.

WHO THE LEADING SHAREHOLDERS OF THE CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY ARE—THE CANADIAN SHAREHOLDERS—ONE-EIGHTH OF THE CAPITAL IN CANADIAN HANDS—A LONDON FIRM THE LARGEST STOCKHOLDER.

(Montreal Star.)

When the Canadian Pacific Railway Company decided, in 1880, to hand over the task of building the Canadian Pacific Railway to some private corporation, a syndicate of wealthy capitalists made an offer which was accepted. This syndicate was composed of George Stephen and Duncan McIntyre, of Montreal, John G. Kennedy, of New York; R. B. Angus and James J. Hill, of St. Paul; Morton, Rose & Co., of London, and Kohr, Reinach & Co., of Paris, who controlled a very large amount of capital. Upon their agreement with the Canadian Government receiving the ratification of the Dominion Parliament, they became incorporated as the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, with a capital of \$25,000,000 in \$100 shares. By the terms of the incorporation, the contract could only be handed over to the Company upon \$5,000,000 being subscribed and 30 per cent paid up. These obligations were fulfilled on April 9th, 1881, and on that day the road was transferred to them.

The capital stock of the Company remained at \$25,000,000 until November 28th, 1882, when, at a special meeting at Montreal, it was raised to \$100,000,000, at which figure it has ever since remained. Of this amount only \$65,000,000 have been issued, placed on the market and disposed of. Of this amount there is a guarantee by the Canadian Government of a dividend of three per cent, until 1893. The stock which has been sold is divided among 1517 shareholders, the majority of whom reside in England, Holland, France and the United States are well represented on the list, while Canada, so far as the number of shareholders is concerned, occupies an entirely insignificant position. Out of the 1500 shareholders, only 35 are residents of Canada, but on the other hand they represent a much larger amount of capital than would be expected from their slim numbers. Most of the directing minds of the enterprise reside in Canada, and the amount of stock they hold brings up the Canadian average. The total number of shares held by Canadians is \$2,958, with a face value of \$3,298,800, or about one-eighth of the entire stock of the Company as yet issued. When it is borne in mind that every 1,000 shares means \$100,000 worth of stock, it will be seen that the above list represents a great deal of capital. Mr. George Stephen, the originator and President of the Company, holds \$2,542,200 worth of stock, the Hon. Donald A. Smith, \$1,750,000; Mr. R. B. Angus, \$1,190,000; Mr. Duncan McIntyre, \$1,035,000, and W. C. Van Horne, Vice-President and General Manager of the road, \$416,300 worth of shares. A portion of the latter gentleman's stock, some 2,803 shares, is reserved.
