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LET'S EAT

Chef's Own Variations Of Creole Gumbo Soup

The chef sat in the test-kitchen staring at a can of Creole gumbo soup on the table.

"This Creole gumbo conjures up very nice flavors in my taste memory of the gumbo soups we enjoyed while on tour in Louisiana."

For instance, the beautiful greenish gumbo; chicken gumbo, plain or combined with oysters; fish gumbo; the fresh vegetable gumbo.

QUICK FAVORITES

We owe it to our readers to show them how to make good gumbo—up facsimiles of these favorites, basing them on this Creole gumbo soup. With your permission, Madame, I take off on this venture.

An hour later I heard, "La soupe! La soupe!" the familiar French call to supper. There stood the chef, in the kitchen, smiling triumphantly before a big pot of steamed rice and 3 portions of gumbo soups simmering on the range.

"Be seated, Madame," he said, "and enjoy these gumbos."

"Now I put into each one of these bowls a big ladleful of rice. I then ladle into each, one of my special gumbo soups—et voilà!"

SPECIAL INGREDIENTS

As a base, I use 2 cans of Creole gumbo and 2 soup-cans of water.

"Then I add the necessary special ingredients from the refrigerator or pantry along with 4 drops Tabasco and a touch of Louisiana File powder which can be purchased at specialty grocery stores. I add the extra ingredients and simmer 15 minutes."

"This recipe serves six."

"Delicieux, and so quick, Chef!" I said. "What special ingredients did you use?"

Here is what he told me:

For Chicken Gumbo: 1 1/2 cups sliced cooked chicken, 1/2 cup thin-sliced celery and 1 sliced scallion.

For Crab Gumbo: Flaked crab meat instead of the chicken and 1/2 cup tomato juice.

For Vegetable Gumbo: 1 1/2 cups mixed vegetables, 1/2 a minced green pepper and 1/2 cup tomato

TOMORROW'S DINNER

Creole Gumbo Soup
Sliced Tongue
Quick Horseradish Sauce
Parslied Potatoes
Green Beans
Minted Colelaw
Raspberry Custard Cream
Coffee Tea Milk
All measurements are level.
Raspberry Custard Cream: Drain the liquid from 1 (No. 2) can red raspberries and heat. Add 1 1/2 tsp. quick-cooking tapioca. Stir-boil until clear.
If desired, add 2 drops red vegetable coloring for a rich raspberry red color.
Spoon the raspberries into glass custard cups. Add the raspberry sauce. Cool.
Top with sour cream custard. Bake about 35 min. in a slow-to-moderate oven, 325 to 350 degrees F., or until the custard is firm and lightly browned.
Serve warm. Serves 6.
Sour Cream Custard: Beat egg with 1 tsp. sugar, 1/2 tsp. pure vanilla extract and 1/2 tsp. flour.
Gradually beat in 1/2 c. whole milk and 1/2 c. dairy sour cream. Use as directed.

Mrs. Harry Kelly, president, opened the meeting in the usual manner and roll call was answered by eight members. Minutes of the previous meeting were read, approved and signed.

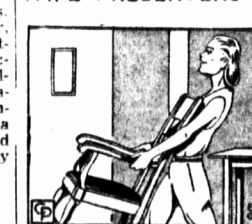
One member paid membership fee. Sick committee reported one call. Mrs. Francis Kelly and Mrs. Ira Redmond were appointed for the next month.

Meeting then adjourned. During a social hour the hostess served a delicious lunch, assisted by Mrs. Felix Redmond.

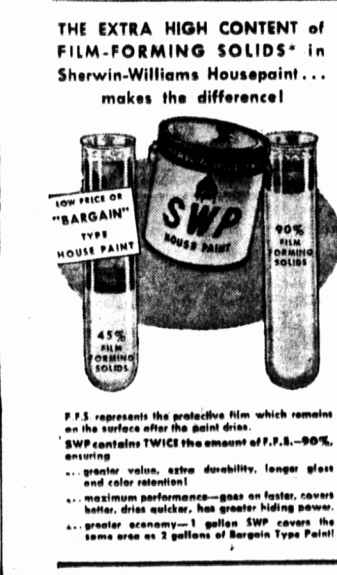
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
