Fire Destroys Old Barn At Montague

Fire of unknown origin yesterday afternoon completely destroyed a barn on the property occupied by Mr. Bruce MacPhee, Montague. Partly destroyed was another adjacent smaller barn. The fire was noticed about 3:00 p.m. by Mr. and Mrs. MacPhee, who were away from home at the time, were notified and rushed to the scene.

The fireman immediately answered the call, but the fire had gained considerable headway and they were unable to save the barn. The presence of five tons of hay in the barn contributed in large measure to the rapid burning of the old building. However, the firemen were able to save the smaller barn from being completely consumed, although it will be of little use.

Fortunately the wind was from the south west, and not too strong, carrying the sparks into an open area. To the west of the fire is located the large building of the Montague Furnishing Company, to the east is the Imperial Oil tanks, and south is the residence of Mr. and Mrs. MacPhee.
