

EXPORT OF COAL.

(Providence Journal.)

In May, 1900, the exports of coal, according to government statistics now available, from the United States were 640,343 tons, an increase of 185,573 tons, or 41 per cent, over the exports of May, 1899. In April, 1900 the coal exports were 537,082 tons, against 387,810 tons in the same month of 1899. In January, 1900, exports were 596,734 tons, against 351,739 tons in the previous January. For the eleven months of the government fiscal year the total exports of coal from the United States were 6,445,073 tons, an increase of 42 per cent, over the figure for the same period in the fiscal year of 1899. The increase over 1898 was 2,832,000 tons, or nearly 80 per cent. Of the total shipment in the eleven months to May 31, 1899, 1,562,117 tons were anthracite and 4,882,956 tons were bituminous. The increase over 1899 was almost altogether in soft coal tonnage, or 1,718,000 tons of the total gain of 1,920,000 in eleven months.

Canada continues to be by far the best customer of the United States, for coal exports to British America in May were 457,650 tons of the total 640,343 tons exported in the month. In the eleven months the exports of Canada were 4,876,189 tons, or over three-quarters of the total exports of the period. Canada also absorbed by far the greater share of this year's export of coal, or 1,655,438 tons of the eleven months' increase. Mexico is the next best customer, taking 587,039 tons in the same period, or 166,270 tons more than in 1899.

Coal exports to Europe are still small, but are making relatively large gains. France, which imported only 1,000 tons in 1899, imported 26,336 tons in the eleven months of 1900. Great Britain, however, which took 7,896 tons in 1899, has imported practically no coal at all from the United States so far this year. The greatest increase in the European export coal trade of the United States has been obtained in Mediterranean markets. Most of the coal exported to France goes to these ports, and the greater share of the other coal shipments to Europe are to southern Europe. Total exports of coal to European ports outside of Great Britain in the eleven months to May 31 were 167,105 tons, as against only 31,200 tons exported to these countries the same period of 1899.

Turkish Magnanimity.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The Daily Express publishes the following from Odessa:

"A party of thirty-eight Turks, wishing to leave Russia secretly, sailed at dead of night from Tschuruks to cross the Black Sea. A storm arose and the boat filled. First the baggage was thrown overboard. Then the children and finally the women were committed to the sea; but this did not prevent the vessel from foundering, and all perished save one lad, who clung to the mast and was washed ashore."

St. John the Winter Port.

MONTREAL, Nov. 19.—The following statement was handed out by the Canadian Pacific railway yesterday: "After negotiations with the premier and other members of the cabinet during the past ten days the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. announces its decision to take export traffic to the port of St. John during the coming winter." On enquiry at the president's office it was learned that while no definite agreement between the government and the company had been reached as yet, the prospect of an arrangement in the near future that will be mutually satisfactory has induced the company at the request of the government to adopt the course outlined above.

The King of Prussia.

BERLIN, Nov. 21.—The Coronation of Emperor William as King of Prussia will take place at Konigsberg, on Friday, January 18th, and the state festivities will last four days. All the German princes will attend, and the courts of Europe will be represented by royal personages, including the Prince of Wales, the Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria, the Grand Duke Vladimir of Russia, the Duke of Sparta, the Duke of Aceta and the Crown Prince of Sweden. The coronation will take place in the Royal Schloss, where the vast Moskowitz Saal is being prepared by court functionaries from Berlin.
