ATTENTION OWNERS OF FARM TRACTORS Every driver of a farm tractor, when operating such tractor on a highway, is now required by Statute to be the holder of a valid driver's license. A person between the ages of fourteen to sixteen years, may qualify for a driver's license by successfully undergoing the prescribed written and vision tests for a regular driver's license, but, such license will be restricted to the operation of a farm tractor only. Appointments for undergoing the prescribed tests may be made at any Motor Vehicle Registration Office. The holder of a valid regular driver's license may use such license when operating a farm tractor on the highways. Farm tractors are not required to be registered.

OTTAWA (CP) — Exporter David L. Maunder has been ordered to pay fines totalling \$41,000 or face a three-year prison term for evading Federal controls on shipments to Russia and Cuba. The 35-year-old former army officer was convicted March 8 on eight charges laid under the Import and Export Permits Act. He has been free on bail since then. Magistrate L. A. Sherwood said he perhaps wasn't giving Maunder much of an alternative defence counsel Patrick Galligan told the court earlier that his client was "in dire financial straits". Mr. Galligan said he is considering appealing the sentence. The sentence is believed to be the stiffest handed out under the 1955 legislation passed by Parliament. Of three reported cases brought to the attention of the

magistrate by special Crown prosecutor Keith Eaton, the heaviest fine had been \$2,000 imposed on a Toronto man found guilty of three offences under the act. Each offence carried a maximum penalty of a \$25,000 fine and five years in prison, or both.

Magistrate Sherwood said he was convinced Maunder meant no harm to his country in his deals to ship electronic and other goods to Russia and Cuba during 1962 and 1963. Nor did he view the goods shipped as electronic and other in the same category as munitions or aids to wage war. But Parliament had a definite purpose in mind in passing the legislation banning goods shipped by Maunder. And Maunder had "a convenient conscience" when it came to making large sums of money.

Fighting Delays Completion Of Southeast Asia Highways

WELLINGTON (AP) — Fighting in Burma and South Vietnam is delaying completion of an all-weather highway from the Middle East to Southeast Asia. Called the Asian Highway, the land network would connect countries of one of the world's most populous regions. It would serve more than 600,000,000 people. When completed, the Asian Highway will be no super-highway in many places. It will be no more than an old camel caravan route that has been graded and paved. But delegates to the annual meeting of the UN Economic Commission for Asia and the Far East (ECAFE) in this New Zealand capital were told Thursday the highway is a project of great importance, increasing trade and bringing different peoples of Asia together in better understanding. The ECAFE report said it is already possible to drive from Western Iran to the Burma border in fine weather. By the end of this year, this will be an all-weather road. Because of its war with rebel bands, Burma's government has closed its frontiers to international motor traffic. Travel over the final eastern portion through South Viet Nam to Saigon also is dangerous because of the war there. HAS TWO MAIN ROADS Two main roads are in the Makin-A-1 (A for Asia) and A-2 that will eventually connect Europe and the Far East. A-1 will run for 6,900 miles
