Italian Island Volcano Erupts

MESSINA, Sicily - (AP) - A new eruption of the island volcano of Stromboli poured hissing lava into the Tyrrhenian sea early today. The red glow could be seen in Sicily, 40 miles away. Many of the 700 fisherfolk of Stromboli took to their boats when the blow-off ripped three new craters in the northwest side of the cone Monday, but they returned at sundown, confident the eruption was no more serious than several others in recent years. Italian naval vessels assigned to evacuate the inhabitants of the five-square-mile island if necessary reported by radio: "There seems no great danger."
