Joy-riding Is Continuing In Summerside

Midnight joy-riding seems to be a new pastime in Summerside. A car or truck belonging to a dealer is usually employed and the vehicle is returned before morning.

Yesterday morning when employees of F. Earle McDonald Ltd. came to work they noticed a second-hand Ford 1-2-ton truck was not in its proper place on the parking lot. On further investigation it was noted that the grill of the vehicle had been damaged slightly and that the gas consumption indicated that it had been driven extensively.

A surprising thing was that the ignition keys were in the truck while they had been in the office the night before. On entering the building it was discovered that a window in the rear was broken, through which entrance had been gained for the purpose of stealing the keys.

It is suspected that juveniles had been hanging around the filling station and garage during the day and making themselves familiar with things so that they would be able to find keys when they wanted them.

Last Saturday night two Summerside boys, ages 13 and 14, had been intercepted at the Airport with a truck owned by Mr. Willard MacDonald and are now waiting trial in the juvenile court. The night previously two cars had been taken from a storage garage of A. Horne and Co. Ltd. and driven about 65 miles each and then returned unharmed.—S.
