SPENT VACATION

NO DELIVERY

There will be no letter carrier delivery service on Monday due to its being Labor Day. However, wicket service at the local post office will be provided from 10 a.m. to noon that day.

NO DISMISSALS

Unofficial reports indicate that a firm machine operators doing government road work have quit their jobs in anticipation of dismissals which they feel will follow a change in government. It is believed however that these employees are in the minority. No official notice of dismissal has been received by any employee & is stated.

Stress on driving safety has gained greater prominence than the actual celebrations by labor.

Starting at 6 p. m. Friday, the Canadian Press began recording traffic, swarming, boating and other fatalities across the nation.

The survey ends at midnight Monday, local time.

64 DEATHS RECORDED

Last year the accidental deaths totalled 64. Of these, 43 were traffic fatalities—one more than predicted for this year.

Newfoundland will be aiming for its third straight fatality-free Labor Day weekend. In Ontario, which usually leads the provinces in traffic deaths, provincial police are going all-out to reduce the toll.

All police time off has been cancelled for the weekend. Motorists will receive summonses to court instead of warnings. Radar speed traps will be unmarked as will be a number of the 617 patrol cars.

Road travel is expected to be heavy all over Canada. Railways and bus lines have added few extra facilities, but Trans-Canada Air Lines has increased the number of flights over routes between large population centres.

SPORTING ATTRACTIONS

In British Columbia golf tournaments are scheduled for Vancouver, Nelson and Revelstoke, plus a track meet in Nanaimo, archery championships in Victoria and a baseball tournament in Kamloops.

Alberta's celebrations will be mostly picnic-and-race affairs. A professional football game in Regina is the only large sporting event scheduled for Saskatchewan. Many Westerners are expected to take a last long look at summer cottages.

Horse races in Winnipeg during the weekend will be the major drawing card in Manitoba. About 1,700 Winnipeg garment workers are threatening strike action but the labor front is generally quiet throughout the West.

Recent labor legislation in Manitoba gives workers two weeks' vacation after one year's service instead of one week after two years.

One of the greatest setbacks to labor in 1959 was in British Columbia. The legislature amended the Trade Unions Act to make unions and employer organizations legally responsible and subject to legal suit.

The act also forbids sympathy picketing and publishing of no-patronage lists by unions — lists naming non-union shops or products and advising against patronizing them.
