Trade Talks At Moscow End But May Be Resumed
MOSCOW (CP)—Canada's External Affairs Minister Pearson and Russia's Foreign Minister Molotov Monday ended trade talks here which will probably be resumed in Ottawa in a matter of weeks. The outcome of the talks was reported to be quite satisfactory and Russia is expected to send a trade delegation for the continued talks shortly. Mitchell Sharp, assistant deputy Canadian trade minister will leave here for Ottawa today. No official statement on the talks has yet been released but it was learned that Canada is of-

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Grain
CHICAGO (AP)—A heavy sell-off of soybean futures contracts on the Chicago board of trade touched off by good harvest weather and large receipts dropped beans 5 to 5 1/2 cents Monday but failed to stampede the other grains.
The sharp break in soybeans caused nervous selling, especially in wheat during early trading, but the cereal grain rallied to show little in the way of losses.
Wheat closed at \$2.05 1/2 to 3/4 for December delivery. Corn closed quoted at \$1.30 1/2 to \$1.31. Oats were unchanged to 1/4 off, December 6 1/4. Rye was down 1/4 to 1 cent, with December closing at \$1.13 1/2.
Soybeans, down 5 to 5 1/2, were \$2.38 1/2 to \$2.39 on the December contract.

fering to Russia what it does to other countries willing to trade. No barter or special clearance deals are being considered, however, because this would be contrary to Canadian policy.
The proposition is likely to be similar to one ready for completion in 1939 which was interrupted by the war. That provided that Canada would give Russia most favored nation treatment in return for a firm guarantee by Russia to buy \$5,000,000 worth of Canadian goods over a period of years.
At the luncheon Pearson told the Russians Canada is willing to serve as a bridge between the U.S.S.R. and the United States. He was told by Molotov that this would be a great responsibility.
There was much frank conversation as Pearson continued his role as an advocate of better relations between East and West. He told the chief guests at the embassy luncheon — Molotov, premier Georgi Malenkov and deputy premier Lazar Kaganovich — that Canada has long been a close but numerically small neighbor to the U.S. and said he believed Canadians knew Americans and certainly trusted them.
The Russians seemed unenthusiastic in their comments about U.S. State Secretary Dulles. They mentioned that Dulles had a summer home on Duck Island near Belleville, Ont., and Pearson jokingly suggested Molotov and Dulles might both visit Duck Island. Molotov replied in the same vein that he did not think the island would be big enough

Markets
N. Y. Stocks
NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market plunged down Monday in its third major break since President Eisenhower became ill. All three drops have come on a Monday. The first two were followed by marked recovery.
Nevertheless, since the high of the year on the Friday before Eisenhower's heart attack, there has been an estimated decline of around \$19,000,000,000 in the quoted value of securities listed on the New York stock exchange. Monday's fall alone accounted for an estimated \$5,000,000,000.
Monday at the opening the market was on the edge of its lowest levels of the break. A rally at this juncture would have been regarded as bullish. The market didn't rally. It opened lower and continued to gather in selling orders as it went down.
During the morning an attempt at recovery was made but when prices failed to hold there was a concerted rush of selling. A second rally attempt also failed. At the close the market was down around its worst levels of the day.
Losses of one to six points were found everywhere. Du Pont fell 9 1/2 at 20 1/2, U.S. Gypsum was off 10 at 28 1/2, and the Cotton Belt Railroad dropped 15 points at 26 1/2.
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was down \$4.60, closing at \$164.50, lowest since last May. At its high this year it stood at \$181.50.
Business mounted to 3,100,000 shares compared with 2,150,000 Friday.
Among Canadian issues, International Nickel fell 3, Canadian Pacific and Distillers Seagrams both dropped 1 1/4, and Dome Mines eased 1/2.
On the American stock exchange, Royalite Oil eased 1/4, Giant

Spotlight's On Shoes In Montreal Next Three Days

MONTREAL (CP)—The spotlight will be on shoes in Montreal for the next three days. The 1955 shoe fair opened Sunday in a midtown hotel and more than 150 footwear manufacturers have their wares on exhibition.
The fair, believed to be one of the biggest in the industry's history, is spread through 210 of the hotel's sample rooms. On display are thousands of pairs of shoes in the newest patterns, color combinations and materials plus a wide range of leathers and products of the allied trades.
One of the main functions of the fair is to supply members of the trade with the latest information on price, style and color trends. It also gives retailers an opportunity to talk with manufacturer on future policy.

DISCUSS PRICES
The question of prices will be discussed today at the annual meeting of the Canadian Shoe Retailers' Association.
Most of the shoes on display come from the 286 footwear factories in Canada. The factories employ 21,500 men and women, have payrolls totalling \$44,000,000,000 and spend an additional \$65,000,000 on materials.
A total of 173 of the factories are located in Quebec province, and another 113 are in Ontario. The Maritimes have six factories and western Canada 16.
Said one industry spokesman: "Canadian footwear today is second to none from the point of view of style and quality. As date machinery and the latest in shoe-making processes. However, being sold in the United States where desirable Canada still maintains its reputation for hand-crafted shoes and these are still being produced although not in as well equipped with up-to-volume."
