JAMES LAWRENCE MARSHALL

The death occurred after an illness of one week at Covehead Road March 10, of James Lawrence Marshall, at the advanced age of ninety years.

He was born at Mermald, son of the late Elizabeth Brown and Lawrence Marshall. He lost his father when a small boy and he, his mother and brother moved to Covehead Road. When he reached manhood he went to U. S. A. where he worked at the carpenter trade. There in Malden, Mass., he married Hettie Carr of Charlottetown and last November they celebrated with their friends, their 60th wedding anniversary.

He returned and bought land on Covehead Road where he built his home and his great delight was to be among his friends and neighbours. He accomplished much in his trade and truly it has been said "his work will live after him." He was a kind father, husband and grandfather. His work was his bond and a warm welcome awaited any one at his home.

His funeral was held at West Covehead Church, March 11 at 2 P. M. Despite poor road condition, a large number of kind sympathetic friends gathered to pay their respects to a departed friend.

Rev. T. Wilson spoke comforting words to the bereaved. Hymns sung were: "The Lord's My Shepherd", "Jesus Lover of My Soul", and "Jesus Saviour Pilot Me", after which his remains were laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery.

He leaves to mourn his sorrowing wife, two sons, Lawrence and Charles E., with whom he resided and who tenderly cared for him in his advanced years. A granddaughter, Audrey, whom he dearly loved, arrived from Moncton for the funeral. Mrs. Evelyn Birt was also a mourner. His second son, Merrill, paid the supreme sacrifice at Vimy Ridge.

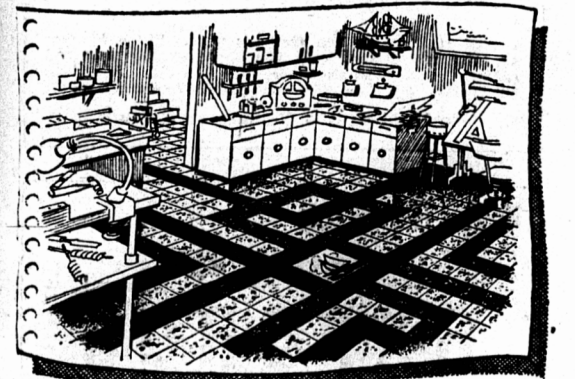
