# Two In Summerside Hospital After Collision On Highway

Two persons are in Prince County Hospital as the result of a two-car collision between cars from Springfield and Borden on Monday on the Trans Canada Highway at a point about one-half mile on the Borden side of the Albany intersection.

Both cars were travelling towards Borden when the accident occurred shortly before noon, at a point on the highway where a small car from Charlottetown was in the ditch where it had been abandoned the previous day.

The accident resulted when a car driven by Sutherland MacKay of Springfield reportedly was about to pass a car driven by Chester Lake of Borden.

The Lake car ended up in the right hand ditch, and he and a companion, Hans Arp, also of Borden, escaped with minor injuries and a shaking-up. The MacKay car ended up on the left hand side of the road facing in the opposite direction to which it had been travelling, and two persons from

this car were taken to hospital at Summerside, while two others suffered lesser injuries and were not detained in hospital.

These were the driver of the car, Sutherland MacKay, and his daughter Marjorie. Mr. MacKay suffered injury to ribs and nose, while Marjorie had minor abrasions to her face.

Those in hospital were passengers in the MacKay car and are William Constable and his daughter Joanna, both of Springfield, near Kensington.

Mr. Constable suffered a fractured leg and lacerations to his face. However his condition is reported to be satisfactory.

Miss Constable also received facial injuries and abrasions in the accident.

Damage to the vehicles is reported to be about \$500 in each case.

The accident is being investigated by the Borden Detachment of the R.C.M.P.
