

Canada Planning For Huge Electric Power Expansion

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada over the next three years is planning the biggest electrical power expansion in history.

By 1959, says the bureau of statistics, there should be enough power—through steam plants and the harnessing of rivers—to run about 100 cities the size of Montreal or Toronto.

Big chunks of that power will be required by the expanding aluminum industry, smelters, mine operators and a host of other industrial needs.

More than \$1,000,000,000 is expected to be poured into the expansion, needed to keep pace with Canada's spectacular economic growth.

All in all, there should be a rise of some 39 per cent in power demand and capacity by 1959, the bureau added. Its estimate is based on an annual survey conducted in co-operation with Canadian public and private power companies.

OUT OF RIVERS

No shortages are envisioned, but bureau officials said Canada is running out of sufficient rivers

that can be harnessed economically and there will be increased use of steam plants for power generation in almost all parts of the country.

Atomic power is expected to produce a small amount of electricity by 1959. Bureau officials said the amount produced will not be significant.

Total power capacity is estimated to rise to 17,086,000 kilowatts by 1959 from the 12,291,000 in 1955—an increase of 39 per cent and the biggest four-year expansion in history.

But the proportion of thermal-steam plant-generation to the total is expected to rise to 15.4 per cent in 1959 from 12.6 per cent in 1955.

Out of the total power capacity—installed through investments of hundreds of millions of dollars in new capital—will flow more than 100,000,000 kilowatt hours of electricity.

NEEDS RESERVES

Canada is expected to use about 101,550,000 kilowatt hours by 1959, a rise of 39.8 per cent from the 73,965,000,000 last year.

Heating and lighting of Canada's cities and farms and the power needed to run the expanding factories and other industries will eat up about 78,181,000,000 kilowatt hours this year.

In 1957 the demand is expected to rise to 86,882,000,000; to 95,199,000,000 in 1958; and to 102,550,000,000 in 1959.

Besides all this power, Canada also needs some reserves. Electrical power in reserve, totalling 1,486,000,000 kilowatt hours last year, is expected to increase to 2,369,000,000 in 1958 and then decline slightly to 2,197,000,000 in 1959.

She was immediately taken to the Charlottetown Hospital, where it was learned that she was suffering from laceration, slight concussion and shock. Her condition is not considered critical and she is expected to be released shortly.

Rehabilitation Of Disabled Is Discussed

A five-day workshop on the rehabilitation of disabled persons, the first of its kind in Canada, took place in Halifax last week, through the cooperation of federal and provincial authorities. From the four Atlantic provinces, persons in attendance represented programs in public health, public welfare, private and voluntary agencies, hospitals and institutions, vocational training, a national employment service, workmen's compensation and leaders in the medical profession.

Ian Campbell, Ottawa, National Co-ordinator of Civilian Rehabilitation, told the opening session that the problem of the Canadian handicapped is tremendous. He said there were almost a million disabled persons in this country of which half are seriously or totally disabled, and 236,000 of them are of working age with only 55,000 actually employed.

Dr. T. H. Coffey, London, Ont., an expert in physical medicine chaired two panels in which the workshop heard detailed information on the medical part in the rehabilitation of a wide variety of diseases and disabilities.

The four provincial co-ordinators of rehabilitation for the Atlantic Provinces are: C. W. Crandemire, Fredericton, N. B.; F. C. Wellard, Halifax, Brigadier W. W. Reid, Charlottetown and W. H. Davis, St. John's, Nfld. Those attending from Charlottetown were: Brigadier Reid, W. S. MacLeod and James Morris.

10,741 Carlots P.E.I. Potatoes Were Shipped

The final Potato Market Report of the season, dated June 8, issued by the Market Information Section, Dept. of Agriculture, Ottawa, P. E. I. whites ranged from \$3.85 to \$4.25 per 75 pounds at Canadian centres.

Exports to the U. S. A. under quota to May 26 totalled 2,793,316 bush. P. E. I. domestic table and seed shipments amounted to 7,132 carlots compared with 6,003 last year.

P. E. I. exports, with previous years figures in brackets were: table U. S. A. 152 (95); table others 1,271 (152); seed U. S. A. 1,744 (1,491); seed others 442 (354); total exports, table and seed 3,609 (2,992); total domestic and export table and seed 10,741 (8,095).

WALK AWAY ULCERS

CHICAGO (AP) — An English surgeon says walking can cure leg ulcers but "you virtually have to brainwash the patients" to get them to walk. Dr. Stanley Rivlin, director of the London varicose clinic, told the American College of Angiology he advises his patients "walk away your leg ulcers." He said walking was successful in the treatment of ulcerated legs in 95 per cent of the patients at his clinic.
