

General Telegraphic News.

VALPARAISO, Nov. 4.—A dispatch from Yaguafon, Brazil, says a further revolution has broken out in Porto Alegre, in the state of Rio Grande do Sul. There is great excitement in the state and it is feared the scenes of the last revolution will be repeated.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 4.—The Russian ironclad Rask, 11,000 tons burden, the largest vessel of the kind ever launched in Russia, was launched yesterday. It is believed she will be able to cover the voyage from Cronstadt to Vladivostok, 19,000 miles, without coaling on the way.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The Department of State has received notice that the Gilbert Islands, lying in the Pacific ocean under the equator, have been placed under the protection of Great Britain. The action of Great Britain was in pursuance of a well-defined colonization system agreed upon by that nation and Germany looking to a division between them of the unoccupied island groups of Polynesia. With the operation of the United States has steadily declined to interfere.

GENOA, Nov. 4.—Baravalle, the waiter who brutally murdered Frank Reilly, one of the crew of the U. S. steamer Newark, while that warship was at this port taking part in the Columbus fete, was today found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to twelve years and six months' imprisonment. He was also condemned to pay indemnity and costs.

BRANTFORD, Nov. 4.—Mrs. Sarah Jane Quick, a resident of Woodstock, wife of Joseph Quick, sued Mrs. Agnes Church, a widow, for \$5,000 damages, alleging she had alienated her husband's affections. The jury returned a verdict of \$2,500 for alienation of the husband's affection and \$2,000 for failure to support—\$4,500 in all. The case was the only one of the kind ever tried in Canada, it is said.

News Notes.

The net profit of the Montreal street railway for the year just closed was \$93,880 21.

The decomposed bodies of nineteen persons have been found in the cellar of a suspected burglar's house in Soudjaky, Poland.

A jury which inquired into the alleged suicide of Schwaka, the explorer, at Portland, Ore., reached the conclusion that he accidentally took an overdose of morphine.

A London cable says the employees of the Bass Breweary Company have struck against new regulations regarding working hours. The strike involves 5,000 men.

Mrs. Sarah Sheppard, aged 104, was burned to death at Brz, Ind., Wednesday. It is supposed a spark from a pipe she was smoking set fire to her clothing.

Destructive forest fires are raging in the southern sections of North Dakota, doing almost incalculable damage to valuable timber.

At the coming session of the British Parliament Mr. Joseph Chamberlain will introduce a bill providing that miners shall not work more than forty-eight hours a week.

Besides the volume just published, Lord Tennyson left a quantity of manuscript poems. It was left to Hallam Tennyson's discretion whether these poems should be published.

Few persons have an adequate idea as to the strength and endurance of the ostrich. Every boy and girl has heard about the ability of this bird to digest with equanimity such dainties as glass bottles, horse shoes, scarp iron and a Tommy chief, but its ability to carry a negro on its back for a distance of six hundred miles is a feat which even the ostrich is not generally supposed to be equal to. The great African bird which was recently presented to Queen Victoria, supposed to be the largest of its species, is said to have accomplished that feat by carrying a young African on its back to Sierra Leone, where it was shipped to Liverpool.

Abstract of the returns made to the British Board of Trade of shipping casualties which occurred to British ships between July 1, 1890, and June 31, 1891, show that the total losses and serious casualties together were 2,469, which was only 3 under the number for 1889-90 and 11 below the average for three years. The number of total losses was 516, being 411 sailing vessels and 137 steamships (tonnage 238,645), which was lower as regards number than any of the preceding fourteen years, except the last two and lower as regards tonnage than any of the fourteen years except the last three and 1877-78. In all 2,081 lives were lost—1,471 being those of seamen and 53 those of passengers and 555 of the latter were lost in the Utqiavik disaster. During the fifteen years ended in June, 1891, 9,831 vessels were totally lost. On the whole the abstracts show a tendency toward increased safety, but a feature of the figures is the increase in the number of missing sailing vessels, which rose from 45 in 1888-89, and 26 in 1889-90, to 64 in 1890-91. This was chiefly owing to the "bizzard" which swept the southwest coast of England on March 9 and 10, 1891, and probably overwhelmed a large number of small craft which were at the time bound round the Land's End, and which have not been heard of since.

How to Make Money.

The following statistics, gathered from reliable sources, are both interesting and instructive, and may be turned into money, so to speak, by farmers and poultry-raisers. The number of fowl has greatly increased in the United States during the last five years, but this increase has been larger in the New England and Middle States than in any other. Twenty-seven States report over one million each. Seventeen States report over two millions each. Thirteen States report over three millions each, while the State of Illinois, New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania report over five millions each. In eighteen of the States the annual average product of eggs per hen is as follows:

Table showing the annual average product of eggs per hen for various states, including Maine, Massachusetts, New York, and others.

It will be noticed that the average number of eggs laid per hen per year ranges from three dozen to over seven dozen and that those States which reported the largest number of hens did not make the most money, because, as the figures show, they only got an average of four to five dozen eggs per hen per year, while the New England States showed an average of from six to over seven dozen. The question arises then why do hens in the New England States average more than seven dozen eggs per year per hen, while in Louisiana they only average three dozen?
