SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Cronin Trial.

CHICAGO, Oct. 25. In the Cronin case the State has much startling evidence against the accused. There is one witness who will swear that from eight o'clock in the evening until the time the wagon which hauled away the body was driven up to the cottage, Patrick O'Sullivan patrolled the street in front of the place, guarding the actual murderers from suspicion or interference. It will also be shown by direct testimony that Dan Coughlin was a frequent visitor at the Carlson cottage during the time it was occupied by Burke and Cooney. This will be proven by the testimony of a resident of the neighborhood, a plumber, who saw Kunze and Coughlin frequently together. The same man also saw Coughlin and Kunze drive up to the Carlson cottage some time before Dr. Cronin's arrival. Him and another witness will testify that on Friday night, the day before the murder, Coughlin and Kunze were together in a Lake View saloon and that Coughlin gave Kunze a sum of money and instructed him what to do. Next night, by other witnesses, it will be shown conclusively that Coughlin, Burke, Cooney and a man whose identity has not been ascertained, were in the cottage when Dr. Cronin was brought there and that they did not leave until midnight. O'Sullivan remained on watch near the cottage until after the trunk had been taken away. The wagon containing the trunk was in charge of Burke, Cooney and the stranger. Coughlin was the first to leave the cottage. All these facts will be substantiated by persons who live near the Carlson cottage and heard part of Dr. Cronin's death struggle.

The Jesuits' Claim.

QUEBEC, Oct. 22. The local government is preparing to hand over the amount of \$400,000 voted the Jesuits in settlement of their confiscated estates. Payment will be made at the government office, Montreal, on the 8th of November, to Father Turgeon, Superior of the Jesuits. A cheque will be made out separately for the above amount, payable to Father Turgeon's order, who will then endorse them over to the parties interested.

The Trade Returns.

OTTAWA, Oct. 25. The trade returns for the first quarter of the present fiscal year are most promising. The exports aggregate \$32,750,000, being \$5,500,000 in excess of the corresponding period of last year. The imports were \$31,500,000, an increase of over \$2,000,000 over the corresponding period last year. The duty collected was \$6,400,000. The total trade shows an increase of \$7,500,000.

A Suggestion.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Oct. 25. Sir Henry Parks, in a speech here to-day, said the time had come for the formation of a distinct Parliamentary Executive to deal with national questions. He proposed a convention of various colonies to be held for the purpose of constructing a Federal Government on the basis of a Federal Parliament.

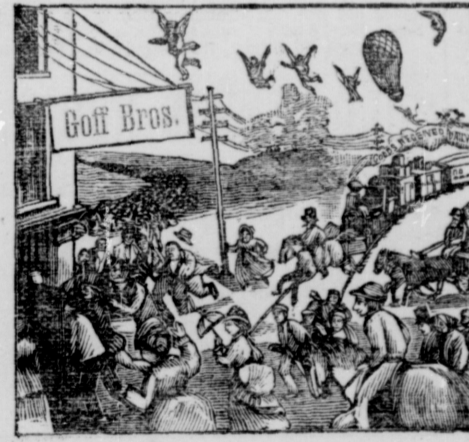
