

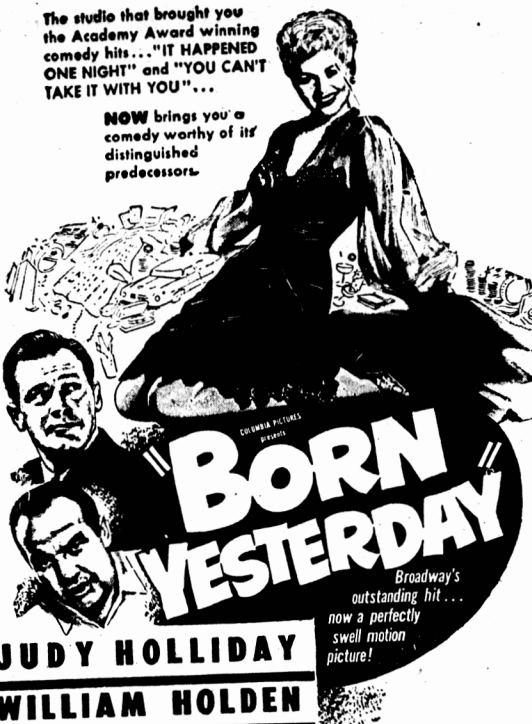

Georgetown Canadian Legion Meeting

A good attendance of veterans featured the regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Branch No. 16, Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L., held in the Legion Hall on Monday, Oct. 15th. Branch president, Rev. W. A. Paterson presided and opened the meeting with the appropriate reading from the Legion Ritual and two minutes silence was observed in honor of departed veterans. The reading and adoption of the minutes of the last meeting was the first order of business followed by the reading and discussion on the correspondence. A membership committee of three was appointed to endeavour to increase membership in the Branch. The members of this committee are: A. H. Stewart, James Aitken and Russell White. The treasurer's report was presented by the treasurer, W. J. Fitzgerald and moved adopted. It was decided to endeavour to popularize the picture shows by advertising in the two newspapers. Marcellus Gotell and Michael Burke, Jr., were appointed a committee to wait on the school trustees and the Mayor and Council to ascertain their attitude regarding the most suitable night of the week to hold the picture show for the winter months, having in mind a suggestion that Friday night would be the most appropriate night for school hockey in the rink. Havelock Stewart was appointed a member of the Monument Grounds Committee to replace Herbert George, who is a patient in Cape Hill Hospital. It was decided that the Branch Executive would meet in the near future to make arrangement for the observance of Remembrance Day. The annual Remembrance Day will be observed on Sunday, November 11th at 2:00 p.m. at the monument and in the Town Hall. It was decided to hold a smoker in the Legion Hall, for all veterans on Monday, Nov. 12th at 8:00 p.m. Arrangements will be made to have pupils from the senior grades of the school sell the Remembrance Day poppies in the town and surrounding areas. Members of the committee to canvass for the sale of wreaths are: Frank Lavender, J. B. Scully, James Aitken, Gordon Yorston and Guy Hemphill. The entertainment committee reported that when the repairs now being done on the Legion Hall are completed they plan an entertainment. believed to be that it would invite Opposition members in the current Throne-Speech debate to contend that the boots—whatever they are—should be greater. Another reason is believed to be that the government has not finally decided itself how large they should be. The Canadian Legion has been spearheading the drive for pension boosts of at least one-third and a spokesman said today the veterans' organization won't be satisfied with anything less. Dan Riley (L.-St. John-Albert) said he welcomed Mr. Lapointe's announcement and was confident the increase will be as "generous" as those enacted for veterans in the past. Hazen Argue (CCF—Assiniboia) said that while he also welcomed the announcement, he felt it was up to members to impress on the government that the full demands of the veterans for a 33-per-cent increase should be met. To Consider Allowance Act Mr. Lapointe's statement at the government opening also disclosed that the government has agreed to ask a special Commons committee to consider at the next session, starting early in 1952, changes in the War Veterans Allowance Act. In particular, said the Minister, there is the problem of the relationship between the W.V.A.A. and the new old-age pensions system because they will affect many of the same people. He said changes in the allowances act arising from the committee's deliberations could be made retroactive to January, 1952, when the new general old-age pensions law comes into effect. Allowances are paid to aged or needy veterans on the basis of need. Pensions are paid as compensation for war disabilities and to dependents of the dead and maimed. Some thousands of veterans drawing small pensions also draw the allowances.

Only Now

Spending during the next 12 months will be greatly increased, said Mr. Howe, "and may approach an average of \$125,000,000 a month or an annual rate of \$1,500,000,000. The peak rate of expenditure will probably be reached early in 1953." Hand-in-hand with Canada's equipment production is the job of producing more strategic materials. By 1955, Mr. Howe estimated, crude petroleum production would triple to 250,000 barrels a day from last year's 80,000. Primary aluminum output will jump to 600,000 tons a year from 415,000 in 1950; iron ore, 19,000,000 tons from 3,917,000; steel, 4,400,000 tons from 3,700,000. TORONTO, Oct. 19 - (CP) - Allan J.
