Keep In Trim

harsh frame for the too-thin or the too-thick neck. A round shiny close fitting collar spotlights a double chin and "adds" weight. The little boy type collar is most flattering to the thin girl. The thin neck and the too-long neck require round and horizontal lines. Material placed high at the throat takes length from the neck and adds to the all-over effect of height. For the tall girl with the thin neck, a short, wide collar is flattering, for this leads the eye shoulder-wise. An unrelieved high round neckline is severe, and is more becoming when worn with a scarf, a flower or a pin at the sides. The way jewelry is worn can make all the differences. Long chains or many stranded necklaces are best worn by tall women. However, if you have a long, thin neck, wear jewelry rounded to give a curved effect. If a chain adds length instead of curves, use a decorative pin at one side bringing the chain into a curve. For slimming magic, wear a thin strand necklace with a medallion or large jewel at the center, worn V shaped. Experiment with your jewelry. Find the most flattering spot to wear a pin. If your neck is thin, try wearing the pin on the collar- or wide on the shoulder. To add length, wear the pin at the dip of the V. It's fun to be your own designer!

Development In Army Research During Year

OTTAWA (CP) — Concentration and rotation were key words for the Canadian Army in 1955. Taking a look at its activities during the year, the army noted today that more than 10,000 troops of the 1st Infantry Division concentrated at Camp Gagetown, N.B., in mid-summer for field manoeuvres culminating in Exercise "Rising Star." At the same time, another 5,000 troops of the 2nd Infantry Brigade concentrated and trained at CMAP Wainwright, Alta. More than 20,000 members of militia units attended 21 camps during the summer, a 25 per cent increase over the previous year's attendance and an all-time high. ROTATE BRIDGES The rotation of two brigades to and from West Germany was carried out during the fall. More than 18,000 troops and their dependents were involved in the move to Germany of the 2nd Brigade and the return home of the 1st Brigade after a two-year hitch in Europe. About 150 troops who had served for a year with the international truce supervisory commissions in Indochina were brought home by air and relieved by a replacement group from Canada. Almost all remaining troops of the 25th Infantry Brigade were brought home from Korea. Only some 200 Canadians, members of the 3rd Field Ambulance, remain in Korea. This number is expected to be reduced further in the next few months. At home and abroad, thousands of soldiers participated in various field exercises. In February, elements of the mobile striking force took part in Exercise "Bulldog III" at Yellowknife, N.W.T. TAKE PART IN TEST In September, the 1st Brigade in Germany was involved in exercise "Commonwealth IV," a five-day scheme held near Hannover. A tri-service group of about 60, with the army's No. 1 radiation detection unit as its nucleus, participated in United States atomic bomb tests in Nevada last March. It came up with a new infantry anti-tank weapon, the Heller, rated the best of its kind in the world, mortar radar locating equipment, a miniature wireless set, a new field telephone, a new and bigger parachute for its airborne battalions, the Troquois flame-thrower and a new method of weaving and processing yarn which increases the strength and durability of textiles five to 10 times that of ordinary materials.

R. C. A. F. REVIEWS 1955

Across Canada and throughout the Canadian Air Division in Europe, important new accomplishments and achievements have developed the work of the R.C.A.F. in 1955. This photo montage notes some of the Air Force's 1955 activities, including purchase of new aircraft, air exercises to test peace-time defences, training of NATO nations and 3000 planes took part in this air operation that included mock atomic attacks. (1) A P2V-7 Neptune, the R.C.A.F.'s new submarine hunter, flies over the Atlantic coast. Maritime Command squadrons now fly this patrol aircraft. (2) A Sabre jet is pulled apart by groundcrew at Metz, France, during exercise Carte Blanche, when defences of western Europe were tested last summer. Eleven NATO nations and 3000 planes took part in this air operation that included mock atomic attacks. (3) The striking nose of the CF-100 symbolizes the interceptor force of Air Defence Command. CF-100 Canucks, with expanding radar lines, play a vital role in North American air defence. (4) An R.C.A.F. Lancaster has brought a patient to a waiting ambulance. More than 130 mercy flights were completed in 1955 by search and rescue units. (5) Equipment is carried to a Sikorsky helicopter used in constructing the Mid Canada radar line.
