

Point To Heavy New Demands For Housing In The Future

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government's housing agency, reporting a drop late last year in the pace of house building, Monday pointed to heavy new demands for housing in the future.

The Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, in its annual report, said the expansion of industries and utilities has caused a "temporary shortage" of housing funds.

"Meanwhile immigration may put new pressure upon the existing stock of housing and in a few years there will be a major increase in the population of marriageable age," the report said.

"To provide the Canadian people with a sufficient supply of well-designed, economical housing will place new demands upon all who contribute to the housebuilding industry."

RECORD YEAR
CMHC reported a record 135,700 housing units completed in 1956, compared with the previous year's record of 127,929.

Under the national housing act, CMHC guarantees mortgage loans made by banks and other lending institutions at fixed maximum interest rates.

IN MEMORIAM THOMAS HENDERSON

On Friday, February 1st, 1957, there passed to his eternal reward one of the oldest of our Island citizens, in the person of Thomas Henderson, Long Creek.

Mr. Henderson, son of the late Archibald and Elizabeth (Heartz) Henderson, was born in (Bannockburn) Kingston, P.E.I. on February 20th, 1857, and, at the time of his death, was only nineteen days short of the Century Mark. He was descended from a long-lived race of pioneers, his maternal grand-mother having lived to the advanced age of 104 years, and his paternal grandmother, 103. He was a member of the family of ten sons and four daughters, all of whom, with the exception of his youngest brother, Richard, predeceased him.

In early life he learned the trade of blacksmith and opened a smithy in Long Creek in 1882. He carried on business here for some years, and later bought a nearby farm, on which he lived until after the death of his wife, when he went to reside with his daughter, Mrs. Myrtle MacPhail, Long Creek.

In 1883, Mr. Henderson married Eleanor Holmes, who predeceased him 33 years ago.
