TIME TO CALL A HALT.

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GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—The Chronicle prints an Odessa despatch maintaining the persistent circulation of rumors of the withdrawal of Czar Nicholas II, from the active guidance of the Empire and the gradual assumption of power by the ex-Czarina, aided by M. Durnovo, minister of the interior, and M. Pobiedonotzoff, procurator general of the Holy Synod.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—James J. Corbett was quietly married to-day at his home to Jessie Taylor of Omaha, known in the theatrical world as Vera Stanwood.

HAVANA, Aug. 14.—Insurgents to the number of four hundred have attacked Port R mblas, which is under construction on the railway to Puerto Principe.

The Rev. DeWitt Talmage has filed for probate the will of his late wife. It gives the bulk of the estate absolutely to her husband, who is made sole executor of the will without bond.

ODDFELLOWS' GRAND LODGE MEETING.

The Oddfellow's Grand Lodge, in Session at St. Stephen, N.B., yesterday, elected S. T. Rogers, of Moncton, Grand Master, and T. B. Grady, of Summerside, Deputy Grand Master.

Grand Master W. H. Rogers, in the course of his very interesting report submitted on Tuesday said: "It is proper that I should make special reference to one of the number gone from us who occupied this chair five years ago."

The grand secretary pronounced the year of his administration as "the most prosperous of any in the history of the order."

The grand secretary, Mr. C. P. Frazer, of Halifax, who has held the office for nineteen years, also presented a well-written report. He showed that there are now seven Hebeek lodges, with a membership of about 350.
