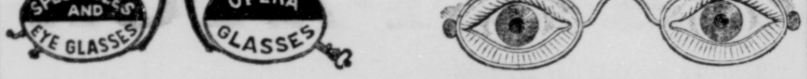

## Organization.

Dr. Theodore Cuyler, in the New York Independent, affirms that one of the chief hindrances to the success of the temperance reform in America is the want of thorough organization and a solid pecuniary basis.

Great Britain the friends of temperance, he says, are far superior both in the matter of organization and the amount of money they raise to disseminate their views. He calls the attention of his countrymen especially to the fact that in one year the United Kingdom alliance subscribed a guarantee fund of £60,000.

## About Taxation.

Dr. Joel Swarty, of Gettysburg, writes: It ought to seem plain that taxes are paid by property, and whatever increases the taxable wealth of a state is a benefit to all taxpayers. Wealth is acquired by the productive labor and savings of the people; increase of taxable property and a decrease of individual property follows. A business that adds not one iota to the wealth of the State, but fills it with crime, pauperism and vagrancy, lousy and numerous ills and burdens, cannot be a source of revenue.

How can that put money into the treasury which makes no money? The liquor traffic appears to put money into the treasury—the money the dealer pays for licenses—but it is only an appearance. If the liquor traffic does not put the money into the treasury, where does it come from? It comes from the drinker to whom nothing useful or needful is given in return. The liquor dealer pays to the public treasury but a very small portion of what he collects from the drinking public. He enriches himself with the greater part of it, and pays a very small portion to the State for the privilege of carrying on a monopolistic and profitable business. And yet some people would claim this as a good system of raising revenue!

The money that has been collected very frequently comes from those who can spare it the least—men who need their money for their wives and children, who beggar their own families to enrich the saloon keeper, and yet some would say this should be continued, claiming that it reduces taxes!

**Y. W. C. T. U.**

Tobacco belongs to the genus *nicotiana* and natural order solanaceae. It is near kin to stramonium or thornapple; hyoscyamus or henbane, belladonna or deadly nightshade. The fact that "it has enslaved three hundred millions of the human race and is now extending its baneful influence more rapidly than ever before," imparts special significance to the testimony of science.

Willard Parker, M. D., says: "I do not place my individual self in opposition to tobacco, but science, in the form of physiology and hygiene is opposed to it, and science is the expression of God's will in the Government of His work in the universe." A British surgeon examined thirty boy-smokers between the ages of nine and fifteen years, and found serious disorders begun in twenty-two, with a more or less marked taste for strong drink generated by the habit of smoking.

Funtana made the following experiments on animals: 1. I made a small incision in a pigeon's leg and applied to it the oil of tobacco. In two minutes it lost the use of its foot. 2. I made a small wound in the pectoral muscles of a pigeon, and applied the oil to it. In three minutes the animal could no longer support itself on the left foot. 3. I introduced into the pectoral muscles of a pigeon a small bit of wood covered with this oil. The pigeon in a few seconds fell insensible.

The testimony of chemists and experts in all kinds of reference to this narcotic is essentially the same. Kämpfer ranks it with strong vegetable poisons. A thread dipped in the oil of tobacco and drawn through a wound made by a needle in an animal killed it in the space of seven minutes. Mr. Brodie found that two drops of the oil applied to the tongue of a cat, with an interval of fifteen minutes, occasioned death.

A New England clergyman sums up these facts and asks: "Now, supposing a chemical analysis should show strawberries possess a deleterious property, and that physicians with united voices proclaimed them a poison, always injurious, and often fatal, who could be persuaded to put them on his table as an article of luxury? What parent would suffer his child to eat them? Laws would be enacted at once prohibiting the sale of them under severe penalties. Why, then, is tobacco so generally used, and why are so few efforts made to save the world from its deadly influence?"

Why? Because of its intoxicating properties. Men are held captive by it in the same way that they are held captive by alcohol. It does not so generally, it is true, make men stagger like alcohol, but it is as really blinding and deceives. Few of those who use alcohol apprehend any injurious results. And just so it is with those who use tobacco. Some of both classes have at times awful convictions that its use is injurious, and will bring them, through a wilderness of woe, prematurely to the grave; but the cup in the one case, and the pipe or quid in the other, nullify their fears.

**Very Strange Case.**

A PRUSSIAN HEAVILY SENTENCED FOR CHANGING HIS FAITH.

According to a recent despatch from St. Petersburg, an interesting case is the one at Nijni Novgorod, where a Prussian by the name of Polotoo has just been given a heavy sentence for having changed from the Orthodox Greek to the Jewish faith. The story of the events which led up to this result is more like a novel than a story of fact.

It seems that Polotoo is the son of a prosperous peasant of an adjacent village and was hired out as an errand boy some twenty years ago to a Jew, Arstein, who kept a store in St. Petersburg. Polotoo proved to be very bright and intelligent, and was promoted step by step until he became the confidential clerk of his employer. Meanwhile, his employer's eldest daughter, who was born some three years after he came to the store, had grown into a beautiful girl, and had in some way fallen in love with him. Although neither Polotoo nor the girl knew it, the father was aware of this love affair, but said nothing. Finally, eight months ago the old man died, and on the reading of the will it was found that he had bequeathed half his entire fortune to his confidential clerk, on condition that he should embrace the Jewish faith and marry his daughter.

Polotoo therefore he began to study the Hebrew language, and then went through the necessary ceremonies of embracing Judaism. Arrangements had just been completed for the marriage to take place, when Polotoo was arrested on the above charge. His trial was short and conviction speedy.

**Made His Fortune.**

AN INVENTION REVOLUTIONIZING THE LITHOGRAPHERS' ART.

Mr. Albert Grignard, of the Department of the Interior, returned to Ottawa from New York a few days ago with his solicitor, Mr. W. J. Code, having completed the sale to a New York corporation of an invention which will revolutionize this department of the printing trade. It is understood that the consideration paid to Mr. Grignard for his invention is in the neighborhood of one million dollars, together with a royalty on all the works produced by his systems. The transaction is one of the greatest magnitude, and will affect the operation of every concern in the lithographic business, not only in the United States, but throughout the world.

Mr. Grignard has succeeded in affecting the lithographic art so as to produce a perfectly toned picture, embracing from fifteen to eighteen colors in his composition, from one, or, at the most three impressions. It originally required one impression for each color so used. This has hitherto been considered an impossibility, but Mr. Grignard has succeeded in finding the secret, for which he has been so well rewarded. Mr. Grignard will remove to New York.

**A TOWN SNOWBOUND.**—A Port Arthur despatch of the 1st March says: This town is again snowbound. A storm from the east overtook the town yesterday, and it raged furiously all day and last night and continues to come down. The consequence is that the snow is almost on a level with the houses and but few dare venture out of doors.

**SNOW IN BOSTON.**—According to a recent despatch the city of Boston has had more than 1,000 men and 700 horses at work clearing the streets of snow this past week. It has already cost the city \$35,000, and it is estimated that unless some big rain come to help it will cost \$100,000 before all the snow is gone. Added to the city's contingent, the West End Railroad Company has been working 1,000 men and 700 to 800 ponies.
