Births, Deaths Down In July

Latest reports from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics indicate that births and deaths declined but marriages increased on the island during the month of July.

Births declined from 283 a year ago to 270 for the month. Deaths numbered 32 compared to 31 in July 1964, while marriages rose from 97 to 102 in July this year.

For the first seven months of the year, P.E.I. births total 1,483 compared to 1,594 in the corresponding period of 1964. Deaths number 561 compared to 547 while marriages show a substantial increase to 308 compared to 258 for the first seven months of the year.

Impaired Driving Convictions Result In Two Fines Of \$125

Fines of \$125 and costs or 30 days were imposed upon John Leslie Casford of Charlottetown and Daniel MacDougall of Tracadie Cross when they pleaded not guilty to drunken driving but guilty to lesser charges of driving while impaired.

The accused appeared before Magistrate A. James Haslam, Q.C. in city police court Monday morning.

Wilbur Alfred Cudmore of New Wiltshire, charged with drunken driving, was remanded until Sept. 13 with bail set at \$150.

Harry Wendell McGee, city, charged with assault was remanded till Sept. 1 without bail.

Glen Newson, city, was assessed \$20 and costs or 10 days on a charge of driving without due care and attention.

Francis Joseph LeClair, city, was fined \$15 and costs or 10 days on a speeding charge.

There were seven drunk and incapable cases on the docket. Three accused were given similar fines of \$20 and costs or 20 days, two were given 20 day suspended sentences, another was remanded without bail till September 4 while one city resident had his case dismissed.

One man was assessed \$20 and costs or 30 days on a charge of illegal possession of liquor.

Over 3,000 Students Eligible For Youth Allowance Benefits

Over 3,150 re-registration forms covering an approximate 3,000 students eligible for receiving youth allowance payments early in September will be mailed to students who were in school in June and who had not reached age 18 by June 30.

This announcement was made yesterday by J.E. Green, regional director for P.E.I. youth allowance payments for students suspended during the summer months.

In addition, approximately 625 initial registration forms will be mailed to children who reached age 18 in June, July and August, and who will be registered for youth allowances in September for the first time.

All registration forms will have to be completed by the parents, who will have to ensure that the School Attendance Certificate is signed by a school official in every case. Cheques will be mailed in time to reach parents on Sept. 30 if all forms are properly completed and returned to the Regional Office

before that time. Mr. Green pointed out that although some incomplete forms will be received, it is hoped that these will be reduced to a minimum this year so as to avoid unnecessary correspondence and delay in issuing payments.

According to the Regional Director, students who are not yet 18 years of age will receive \$30 at the end of September if they enroll at the beginning of school and remain in school at least until the end of September. Students who reached 18 years during July and August will receive one payment of \$10 and \$20 respectively if they return to school in September. During the past school year an average of 3,380 students received Youth Allowances each month, with payments for the 10 months ending in June totalling \$333,500. Payments for the current year are expected to exceed \$400,000.
