The worst escape was that of Mr. Adam Hamilton, who was on the platform delivering an address when the lamps fell and exploded almost at his feet. All present exhibited wonderful coolness, except some young ladies who were on the platform. No blame is attached to anybody, as it is believed that it was all purely accidental. In other respects the social was a success, a large sum being realized from the sale of pies. Messrs. H. Bowness and Joseph Davison acted as auctioneers.

WHAT ABOUT SEED GRAIN?

Sir,—I see that both the Dominion and Local Governments are expending large sums in delegations for the purpose of benefitting our farmers. For the same purpose they are doing, or talking about doing, a great deal for cold storage. About a quarter of a million dollars has also been spent in taking the plebiscite, and this also they assure us, has been expended for the purpose of benefitting the people. Now, this is all right, as far as it goes. But our farmers are, at the present, in need of more direct assistance. The government no doubt, is aware of the almost total failure of the grain crop last year. This, combined with the partial failure of our fisheries for the last year or two, leaves the country in an almost helpless condition. Unless the government comes to the aid of the farmers in the important matter of procuring seed there will be nothing to export next year as a great many will be unable to procure it themselves and as a consequence, the money expended in delegations, as far as our farmers are concerned will go for naught. Formerly the farmers used to depend on the merchants in such cases; this year, however, the merchants are unable to come to their assistance as they have not got the seed to give them; and I think it is now the duty of the government to take the matter in hand and see that seed is procured. Hoping this matter will be given deserved consideration.
