A third minister pointed out that the government has taken an option on some land in the college area and that "residents nearby are in favor of a residence there they would prefer not to see the area become commercialized."

On the subject of land purchases by the government, consideration is also being given to the securing of sites for a new liquor store and new cold storage facilities in the Charlottetown area.

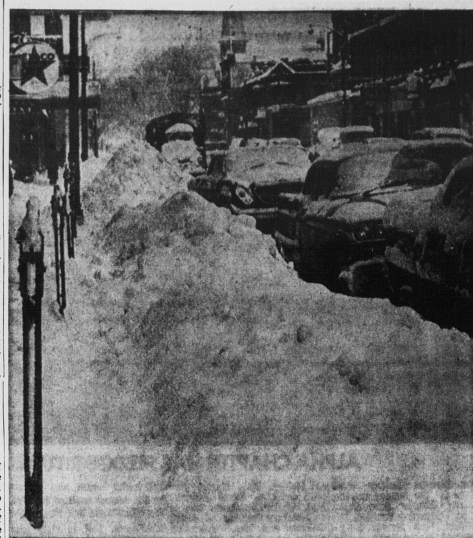
