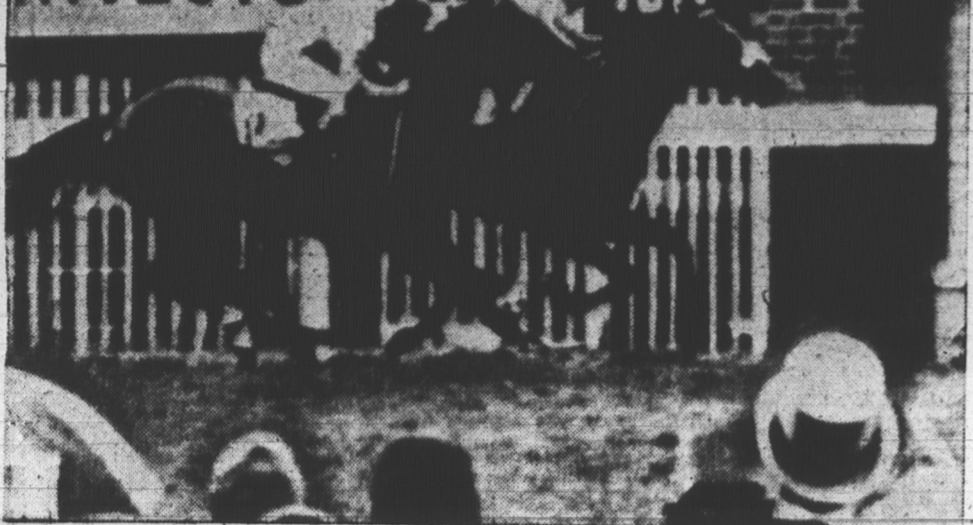

Eng. Horse Charlottown Captures English Derby

EPSOM (AP) — Charlottetown with Black Prince, hope of an English-owned colt ridden by ward Benjamin of New Orleans, grandpa Scobie Breasley of another five lengths back in Australia, won the 187th running and richest Epsom Derby Wednesday with a margin of 1 1/2 lengths before the start of the rain-soaked race. Black Prince, a 20-1 shot, led near the finish of the 25-year-old colt, worth \$208,569. Charlottetown had shoe trouble. An emergency call went over the 1 1/2-mile turf course out for a blacksmith. Breasley, 52 years old, but with nerves of a man half his age, waited patiently.

Indy '500' Priest Has Never Seen May 30th Classic

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — A quarter-century after the Indianapolis 500-mile auto race but he's never seen a wheel turn. The Rev. Leo Lindaman, priest at St. Christopher's Catholic Church in the town of Speedway, has stationed himself at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway hospital for every Memorial Day race since 1937. "I never made myself a nuisance," said the 69-year-old Father Lindaman. "I just try to stay nearby. If they need me, they'll find me." He was referring to drivers, car owners, mechanics, their wives and children. Father Lindaman, who built the church named for the patron saint of travel, wasn't an avid race fan before moving to the parish from Martin County, Ind. "I used to enjoy listening to the races on the radio, but I wasn't a particular fan," he said. "However, my first year here I was at the track every day during the month of May."

Boston Red Sox Display New Look And Attitude

BOSTON (AP) — Boston Red Sox are displaying a new attitude as well as a new look in their bid to regain respectability in the American League. The country club atmosphere so prominent in recent years appears to have disappeared under the leadership of manager Billy Herman and outfielder Carl Yastrzemski, the team's first official captain. "We're finally starting to jell," Herman said Wednesday. "We had hoped to get off to a good start, but didn't. However, the kids didn't lose their confidence and kept battling. Now a few things are going our way."

LONGEST SINCE 1963

The Red Sox carried a six-game winning streak, their longest since June, 1963, into Wednesday night's game with Minnesota Twins. After finishing ninth last season—a fun-filled campaign despite a series of stiff lines dished out by Herman—the Red Sox cleaned house, getting rid of half the team. A new look was installed with the emphasis on youth and defense. The players, themselves, decided on a new attitude in spring training. With Herman's permission, they held a meeting, led by Yastrzemski and veteran reliever Dick Radatz. "We decided we didn't want any more bad publicity," Yastrzemski said. "We've been ridiculed all over the league and decided it has gone far enough."

Key Proposal Is Accepted During CAHA Meeting

By AL McNEIL MONTREAL (CP) — A proposal that could bring peace between the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and the National Hockey League was accepted Wednesday by delegates attending the CAHA's 50th annual meeting. The motion, submitted by the organization's executive committee, calls for preparation of a memorandum outlining proposed changes in the current pro-amateur agreement. It requests that the two factions meet within the next 60 days to discuss the issues. The membership agreed with CAHA secretary-manager Gordon Juckes of Melville, Sask., that details remain confidential until such time as the meeting proposed can be held. Lionel Fleury, of Quebec City, CAHA president, who helped draft the proposal with his executive Tuesday night, was absent from Wednesday's session. He was confined to his hotel room by a recurrent heart ailment and will be forced to remain there until the end of this week. Fleury left a Quebec hospital against the advice of his doctor to attend the sessions, which started Sunday and finish Friday. Fred Page of Vancouver, first vice-president, took over in Fleury's absence. HELD TO PACT TERMS At last year's annual meeting in Victoria, the CAHA voted to end a pact signed with the NHL in 1958 for a 10-year period. However, the contract contained a clause which called for two years' notice of termination by either party, thus holding the CAHA to the terms of agreement until June, 1967, rather than June 1965. The controversy hinges on the distribution of the funds paid by the professionals for amateurs drafted to professional ranks and the pro sponsorship of amateur team. In other business, the meeting selected Kingston, Ont., as the site of the Canadian midget hockey championships, to be held there Easter holiday week, 1967. The event will be the CAHA's centennial project. The meeting also passed a motion requesting that all

In a move to make hockey safer at minor level, a rules committee recommendation that all players under the junior A category be required to wear protective helmets, was passed when chairman Page cast the tie-breaking vote in favor of the motion. B-A Oil Company Plans Expansion NEW YORK (AP) — British American Oil Co. outlined Tuesday a scheme which, among other things, would provide funds for expansion of its operation in Canada. Stockholders of British American will be asked to approve May 31 an agreement for sale of British American Oil Producing Co., a subsidiary, to Chared Corp. of Dallas, which in turn would sell the assets of the subsidiary to Gulf Oil Corp. Under the agreement, Chared would pay \$182,544,000 for the subsidiary, which then would liquidate. Its assets would be sold to Gulf, except for certain cash and a production payment reserved by British American Oil producing out of certain of its oil and gas properties. It was announced that proceeds from the sale would be applied by British American Oil Co. as follows: \$65,150,000 to repay notes owing to the U.S. subsidiary, payment of \$40,755,000 owed to Gulf for current accounts payable and the balance of \$81,639,000 for reinvestment in expansion and development of British American operations in Canada. COLLECT KEY DOCUMENT ROME (AP) — Rev. Cosimo Bonaldi, has given the Italian state archives the original document signed in 1943 by 19 top Fascist leaders expressing non-confidence in dictator Benito Mussolini. Niccolo de Cesare, a Fascist official, gave it to the priest on his deathbed.
