

SDU Defeat St. FX 45-43 But Lose Maritime Ch'ship Series By Three Points

A hard fighting band of smoothened passing Saint Dunstan's University hoop players defeated St. Francis Xavier University by a 45-43 score last night but failed to arrest the Maritime intercollegiate basketball championship from the defending Xaverians.

The Ambrose Gimlet coached quintet retained their Maritime college crown by winning the two-game total point series 98-95. The Xaverians won the opening game of the series 55-50 in Antigonish a week and a half ago.

Last night's game was played at the S. D. U. gymnasium before a large crowd of fans. It was the first time that Saint Dunstan's won a basketball game from St. F. X. during the three years that the teams have been competing against each other.

The game was very closely played and the outcome was in doubt until the final whistle. The Xaverians who with one exception are composed of United States players, were a much heavier team than their opponents. Richards weighs 230 lbs. and MacFarland 210; however the excessive weight of these two boys did not have any appreciable effect on their playing ability both of whom could move with outstanding speed.

Saint Dunstan's were led to victory by their high scoring ace

Jack Reardon with 19 points while Korbut of St. F. X. scored 25. The first half ended with St. F. X. leading by a 22-19 score, but a series of quick goals by Reardon, Shea, Taylor, Dorias and Mooney wiped out the visitors lead at the end of the third quarter, and the Saints went ahead by three points. In the final canto, St. F. X. outscored their rivals by a point but the hard pressing Saints almost had the series within their grasp only to be denied when their opponents froze the ball.

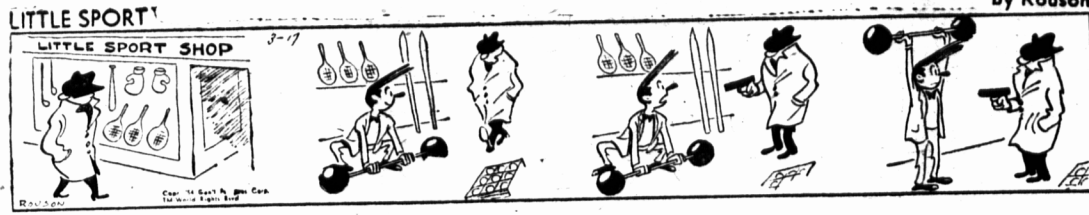
Welshmen And Aces Clash To Decide Series Tonight

Millionaires Closer To Playoff Berth With 3-1 Victory Over Glace Bay

SYDNEY, (CP)—Sydney Millionaires moved closer to a final playoff berth Tuesday night by downing Glace Bay Miners 3-1 to take a 4-1 lead in the best-of-nine Maritime Major Hockey League semi-finals.

The sixth game will be played in Glace Bay tonight.

Captain George Robertson again led Mills to victory by scoring the winner in the first minute of the second period and another in the last seconds of the third. Miners' goalie Neil Amadio got the other Sydney goal.

The Aces have jumped over the hurdle which all season they have feared the most. The Borden Nationals, which is practically the Cape Traverse Rovers under another name, looked like the "two-gun" club which would beat the "Four Aces" shown on the uniform of the Schurman-Baglole outfit. The guns must have had blank cartridges. They didn't come anywhere near to threatening the onward march of the Aces club to an Island title. The O'Leary Maroons were a slightly bigger threat, in fact, Aces best O'Leary 12-7, and Borden 15-5.

We saw the green-shirted youngsters in action against Summerside and would say they'll take whatever is left of bantam competition on the Island. Their team work was impressive, showing careful coaching. The trouble with the Summerside bantams, they are an all-star aggregation, and played together a very short time.

Prince County has lost one title they held last year. Borden National Sisters were 1933 P. E. I. champs, but the crown recently crossed the county line and is now with the Abbie Sisters of Charlottetown. The O'Leary Maroons surrendered their Island title, but Prince County may still hold on to it. If the Summerside Aces can knock off the winners of the Milton-Montague contention.

The Kensington Pee-wees, last year Island champs, have started out on the right foot again by winning Summerside, but they still have a tough row to hoe.

Milton Hornets edged out the Montague Shmoawks 3-2 at Montague last night in a battle royal between two evenly matched teams, the outcome of which remained in doubt until the final bell. It was the opening game in a home and home series for the Kings-Queens intermediate B hockey title.

A packed house saw the game of the year as the two giants struggled to overcome the other in the equal tussle. A terrific pace, constant pressure, fast skating and passing, and body checking were the features of a top performance of two teams who put forth their best. DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP)—Halifax Atlantics, held together by goalie Roy McMeekin, defeated Charlottetown Islanders 3-2 Tuesday night to take a 4-2 lead in the best-of-nine Maritime Major Hockey League semi-finals.

Although outshot 2-1 the Atlantics took a 3-0 lead before the Islanders scored late in the second period and scored the only goal of the third. The game was played in the Dartmouth rink before a sell-out crowd of more than 4,000. An ice show is playing at the Halifax Forum.

Pete Wyvrot drilled a shot past goalie Roger Bessette with the game only 45 seconds old to give Halifax the lead, and Bill Ford struck early in the second with a sizzling shot that Bessette barely saw.

Halifax coach Dugger McNeill made it 3-0 and was followed a few minutes later by Vince Palladino who finally got one past McMeekin after being foiled on several good chances in the period.

Roy (Buck) Whitlock made it 3-2 in the third.
