# Unexpected Opposition By Rebel Forces In Oman

KERSHA, Oman (AP) — Unexpected resistance by the forces of the Imam of Oman caused a mixed British and Muscat force of 700 men to pause Friday for a general overhaul before attacking Firq, about two miles north of Kersha. The army of the Sultan of Muscat and Oman reached the outskirts of Firq Thursday but ran into heavy rifle fire from well concealed positions. It withdrew Thursday night into Kersha to prepare a concerted attack. (British sources told The Associated Press in Manama, Bahrain, that Brig. J. A. R. Robertson, commander of the joint ground forces, flew to Manama from Oman to urge an all-out air attack on Firq. Up to now the British have refrained from action that might result in the death of many Arabs. It was said that the rebel cave hideouts had been located, and a program to wipe

out the defenders was expected today. A British spokesman at Bahrain said a Trucial Oman scout was killed in the battle for Firq. The scouts are from the cluster of British-protected Persian Gulf sheikdoms bordering Oman.)

DUG IN Talbe ben Ali, leader of the rebel forces for his brother Ghalbe ben Ali, Imam of Oman, is reported dug in at Firq with 200 trained men. They are the hard core of the imam's forces. About 40 of them formed an outpost that resisted stubbornly in a little fort about one mile outside Firq before they were blasted out by rockets from Venom jets Thursday. They escaped to the hills without any known casualties.

Robertson said: "We met stronger resistance than was anticipated."

He ordered a withdrawal to Kersha as the nearest suitable campsite. Friday, he said, would be devoted to overhauling vehicles and radio equipment and

considering the best move to make against Taleb. His column was reinforced during the night by five light armored cars that were flown from Aden. Sweltering heat up to 130 degrees caused severe discomfort to the Scottish troops.

A column of the Muscat forces coming from the direction of Firq, on the Gulf of Oman, is reported 15 miles north of Iqbi, near Samali, a gap in the mountains. That puts it less than 30 miles northeast of Kersha. (Niwa, the rebelling imam's capital, is between the two forces.)

PLANS UNKNOWN No plans are known yet for a junction of the two columns. It is believed more likely the Muscat column will devote itself seeing the eastern part of the country is quiet while this one, known as Carterforce, pushes up in the direction of Taunt in the Muscat mountains. Thursday's clash showed the imam's "hard core" deserved its name.

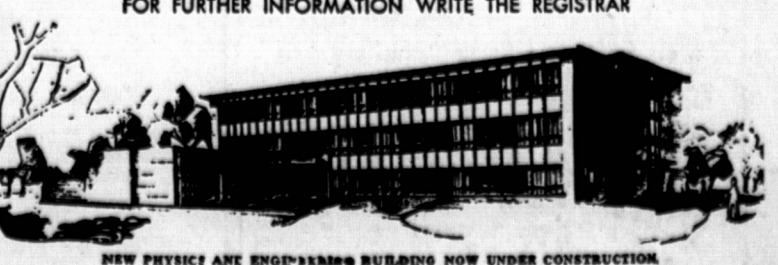
