

Crown Native Captures Governor-General's Match

CONNAUGHT RANGES, ONT.
 The Dominion of Canada Rifle Association's annual matches had their most dramatic ending in years Saturday when a Crown Native team took top place in the Governor-General's match, main event of the week-long shooting.

Winner of the tie-breaking round, fired before hundreds of spectators, was the Crown Native team, led by along the firing point, was FO B. Pitcairn, a 24-year-old Flying instructor stationed at Portage La Prairie, Man.

Pitcairn, a native of Charlottetown, outscored the veteran Bismarck rifleman to become one of the youngest shooters ever to win the Governor's General's Medal, most prized Canadian service rifle award.

Tied at 216 points apiece with the RCAF officer after the regulation shooting were Lt. Col W. J. (Bill) Strachan of Ottawa, Sgt. Ralph Cathline of Camp Borden, Ont., and G. F. Arnold of the British rifle team that competed at the matches.

Strachan and Cathline were eliminated after failing to keep pace with the perfect scorers of Pitcairn and Arnold in their first five shots.

Arnold Palmer Captures Classic

AKRON, Ohio (AP) — Arnold Palmer, leading from start to finish, mastered Firestone's 116th annual PGA American Open Classic Friday and smash his own money-making record for one year.

Pounding out a 36-34-70 for a four-day total of 276, the strong man from Pennsylvania won the tournament by a whopping five strokes over the runner-up, 30-year-old Tiger Woods, who won \$9,000. Palmer's \$25,000 prize money was the largest in the history of the event.

It was the eighth tournament triumph this year for the 32-year-old Palmer, who has now won 36 victories during his career. The Master and British Open champion, the only man to beat par 72 holes had rounds of 67, 69, 70 and 70 over the par 35-70 course and earned an additional \$3,125 in bonuses.

Ant. Junior Golfer Grabs Two Ch'ships

WINNIPEG (CP)—Sue Hilton, 18-year-old Ontario open and junior champion, Sunday swept the Canadian women's close and junior title championships at Winnipeg's Elmhurst Golf Club.

In the final 18 holes of the 54-hole medal play championship the London, Ont., student scored three-under-par 70 for a total of 237 on the 6,244-yard par 70 course. She topped Edmonton's Betty Stanbury, who earlier had scored a 78 for a 238 total and secured a place in the final.

It is believed the first time a junior has won both championships.

Miss Hilton, a second-year student at the University of Western Ontario, had six birdies, including the eighth, ninth, 10th, 11th, 15th and 16th holes. She was never in trouble except on the 16th.

On that hole, she hit her second shot into a fairway trap, clipped to within four feet of the cup, and holed out her putt.

Playing eight flights behind Mrs. Cole, Miss Hilton said she didn't find out what the former Canadian open and junior champion had scored until the 17th tee.

It was Miss Hilton who Friday breathed life into the tournament by scoring the only hole in one on the par three 130-yard 13th hole at Winnipeg's Southwood Golf Club.

She played the first nine in one over par 30 but came in on the par 40 back nine four under at 26.

Ron Giggey Defends Title

Ron Giggey successfully defended his Charlottetown Golf Club Junior title Saturday, topping a field of 40 entries with a 36-hole total of 166 made up of rounds of 84-82.

Runner-up Don Maund finished 12 strokes off the pace at 174 with rounds of 88-87. Bobby Lewis shot rounds of 86-91 to finish tied at 177.

John Daley took low net with 164.

Billy MacMillan was the winner of the girls 36-hole match with Audrey Grant finishing second.

Girls' 18-hole competition saw Barbara Morehead finishing on top and Jo-Anna MacKenzie second. Anne Irwin took low net.

In the boys' first year competition it was Joey Brown the winner and Barry Clarke second.
