Personal.

WALTER SHANLEY, the well-known engineer and manager of the St. Lawrence and Ottawa Railway, is lying dangerously ill at the family homestead in Thurston, near London, Ont.

BARON JAMES FOTHSCHILD, who died on Tuesday at his residence in Paris, was the son of the ninth son of Mayor Assm in Rothschild, the banker of Frankfurt, who rose from a poor Jewish boy to the proud position of the leading financier of the world. He died in 1812, and his five sons became the heads of the Rothschild banking houses in Frankfurt, Vienna, London, Naples and Paris. All were made barons by the Emperor Francis. The James who just died was the head of the Paris house.

How common it is to speak of a strong man's eccentricities, or his peculiar faults, as if they were the source of his power. Even the boorishness, and incivility and ill-nature of a man, or his over-weening vanity, or his violent and ungoverned temper, and his selfish disregard of the feelings and the rights of others, are sometimes spoken of as elements of strength in him. Yet it is invariably true that such a man has made all his progress and gained all his power in spite of these faults, and not in consequence of them. If he was without these drawbacks, or if he held them in control, he would be more of a man, and do a better work than now. A recent writer on (Sismarck has just emphasized this truth:— "In judging a hero there are two facts to be born in mind. First, it is not his objectionable, but his good qualities that have enabled him to play a great part. Otherwise it were necessary to despair of humanity. Secondly, where the faults are conspicuous the redeeming virtues must be of no ordinary kind. Some French writers have lately been trying to destroy the fame of Napoleon. The attempt is sufficiently futile, but the Lantreys and others do prove the conqueror of Europe to have been a person of many vices. Only they fail to understand that by this process they raise the man to a rather loftier eminence than he previously occupied. For what must have been the genius which so triumphed over the flaws of mind and heart that its possessor not only ruled a continent, but won the love and homage of millions?" If you are conscious of any peculiar faults which are recognized and tolerated by your friends, do not nurse them, or even give them tolerance yourself, in the mistaken notion that they are elements of your strength and attractiveness. You are doing all that you do of good, and holding all the friends you still retain, in spite of those faults; and you would do a great deal better and have more to love you if you conquered them. And if you see the evident faults of one who is widely recognized as a strong man or as a good one, and who attaches many to him, be sure that he has positive good qualities overbalancing those poor ones.

MOVEMENTS OF THE FISHING FLEET AND RECEIPTS.—The shore fisheries are active, the fleet having landed since our last issue about 195,000 lbs. hake, 40,000 lbs. pollock, and 13,000 lbs. cusk, and 10,000 lbs. hake have been received from the Bay of Fundy, not included in our table below. Some 1,400 qts. of mixed fish, cured, mostly hake, have been received from the outports. The other fish receipts have been as follows:—

For the corresponding week of last year there were 57 arrivals, with 658,000 lbs. codfish, 259,200 lbs. halibut and 2995 bbls. mackerel. Last week we reported 48 arrivals, with 536,000 lbs. codfish, 215,200 lbs. halibut, 6977 bbls. mackerel, 94,000 lbs. hake, 800 qts. cured do, 200 qts. codfish, 200 qts. haddock and cusk, 23,000 lbs. shore haddock.—Cape Ann Advertiser.
