

Ch'town Baptist Church Will Be Opened May 17

The official opening of the church edifice to house the congregation of the First Baptist Church of Charlottetown, is set for Sunday, May 17th.

The guest preacher for the morning will be a former pastor, Rev. I. J. Levy, B.A., B.D., S.T.M., D.D., pastor of the Queen St. Baptist Church, St. Catharines, Ontario, and the guest soloist for the day will be Corey Smith, ARCM, baritone, the organist and choir director of the Park Lane United Baptist Church, Moncton, N.B.

At the Sunday evening service, the Rev. George Allen, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Truro, N.S., and the immediate past president of the Maritime United Baptist Convention will be the speaker.

Following the evening service, Mr. Smith will be heard in a sacred recital accompanied by Mrs. V. Leigh Dingwell.

Following opening day, a week of dedicatory service will be held, climaxed by special services on Sunday, May 24th.

On Tuesday evening, the church will be dedicated to the community, and the speaker for the occasion will be the Rev. Keith Hobson, Summerside, the moderator for the P.E.I. Association of Baptist Churches.

On Wednesday night, the church will be dedicated to the training of youths. Rev. Ross

Howard, a former president of the Maritime Baptist Young People's Union Convention, will be the speaker.

On Thursday evening, the church will be dedicated to the denomination with the general secretary of the Maritime United Baptist Convention, Rev. Harry Renfree, as speaker.

On Friday evening, the church will be dedicated to evangelism and missions, and the speaker on this occasion will be Rev. Abner Langley, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Moncton.

The climactic services of dedication will be held on Sunday, May 24th, at which time the church's relationship to the Maritime Baptist educational institutions will be considered.

At the morning service, Dr. Watson Kirkconnell, president of Acadia University, will speak on the subject "More Stately Mansions"; Rev. D. A. Milton, M.A., B.D., principal of the United Baptist Bible Training School, Moncton, will speak at the evening service. The male quartet representing the School of Theology of Acadia University will provide sacred music throughout the day.

This statement was made by S.H. Burhoe of Charlottetown, who was subsequently re-elected chairman of the organization at a meeting held in the Charlottetown Hotel.

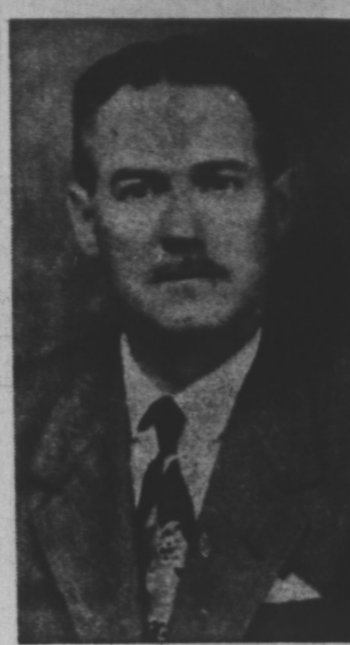

Gerald J. (Jed) Maddigan, one of Canada's three top blood donors, will be honored Monday evening in a presentation ceremony, sponsored by the Canadian Red Cross Society.

At the ceremony, being held at the Clover Club, Charlottetown, with F. A. S. Jones, provincial chairman of the blood donor committee as master-of-ceremonies, Mr. Maddigan will be the recipient of a special citation along with a letter of congratulations from the Central Council of the Canadian Red Cross.

At the series of blood donor clinics opening in Charlottetown on Monday, Mr. Maddigan will bring his record of donations to a total 117. The ceremonies are scheduled to open at 7:30 p.m. with the arrival of His Honour, Lieutenant Governor F. Walter Hyndman. Following a few introductory remarks by Mr. Jones,

the letter of congratulations will be read and presented to Mr. Maddigan by His Honour Judge J. S. DesRoches, president of the P.E.I. branch of the Canadian Red Cross.

Next on the program will come the presentation of the special citation by Governor Hyndman, followed by a response from Mr. Maddigan.

For the final portion of proceedings A. F. Archer, chairman of the Charlottetown committee will present Mr. Maddigan with a celebration cake, being specially prepared and donated for the occasion by Stewart's Bakery.
