TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Terrible Railway Accident.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 6.

A disastrous accident occurred on the Canadian Pacific Railway, near Rat Portage about 1 o'clock last night. Two heavy freight trains ran into each other and rolled down an embankment. Engineers James and Kendall were probably fatally injured and fireman Emerson and two forward brakemen were also badly injured. The accident was caused through a blunder of the despatcher.

Editor O'Brien's Treatment.

LONDON, Nov. 5.

The Governor of Tullamore Jail has been ordered to compel Editor O'Brien to wear the prison garb and perform prison labor. It is stated that O'Brien has been reduced to bread and water, to be starved into submission. It is feared a mob will harm the jail. It is said O'Brien will resist to the death.

Dynamite in Prison.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.

The cells of the condemned Anarchists were searched to-day. In Lingus cell six dynamite bombs were found. Most of the men were removed to new cells and all privileges denied. Special officers will watch each man till the execution.

To be Superannuated.

OTTAWA, Nov. 6.

The Minister of Customs is receiving special reports from the principal ports throughout the Dominion, with a view to the superannuation of all customs officers who have reached sixty-six years of age. The Minister expects in this way to effect a large saving without impairing the service.

Another Big Blaze.

ST. THOMAS, Ont., Nov. 6.

A fire started in Wilson's Dye Works last night; from there it spread to the factory, grist mill, wool house and dry house, all of which were totally destroyed. The loss is \$20,000; insurance \$5,000.

The Gold Yield.

OTTAWA, Nov. 6.

It is stated on good authority that some of the Sunbury gold quartz assayed as high as \$30,000 a ton. In the poorest of it the vein of gold is as large as a lead pencil.

Hon. Mr. McMaster's Successor.

OTTAWA, Nov. 6.

It is understood that John McDonald, the millionaire dry goods merchant, of Toronto, will succeed Hon. Mr. McMaster in the Senate.

The New Chief Justice.

OTTAWA, Nov. 6.

Judge Galt has been appointed Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas of Ontario, vice Sir Adam Wilson resigned.

Lord Lansdowne's Successor.

LONDON, Nov. 5.

It is reported that Lord Hanley, of Preston, will succeed the Marquis of Lansdowne as Governor-General of Canada.

Missionary Services.

The Annual Missionary Sermons were preached yesterday in the Methodist Churches of this city to large congregations, by Rev. Y. Hiraiwa, of Japan, and Rev. Robert Wilson of St. John. The Rev. Mr. Wilson occupied the pulpit of the Brick Church in the morning, and preached from John 12-4, in a clear and impressive manner. He showed that from the law of suffering and death came life and fruitfulness; and how, in the christian system, this law reached its highest manifestations and triumph. In the evening, the Rev. Mr. Hiraiwa discoursed from "I am the way and the truth and the life." In an interesting manner he pointed out the darkness of the heathen world, and the utter inability of their best teachers and Philosophers to find the way of life and happiness. The relation of his personal conversion to Christianity, and that of his two companions now in the ministry, and the persecution to which they had been subjected on account of their renunciation of Buddhism, made a deep impression on the congregation.

The pulpit of the Second Methodist Church was occupied in the morning by the Rev. Mr. Hiraiwa, who preached from Math. 5, 4.—"Ye are the light of the world"—and in a most interesting manner showed in what sense Christ, Christianity, and every true believer furnished the light essential to the world's highest illumination, and the final removal of the dreary moral night which has so long rested upon the human race.

Remembering that the Rev. Mr. Hiraiwa never addressed an audience in his life in the English language until some two weeks ago, it is almost a miracle how he can command such an excellent choice of words, and make himself so intelligible to large congregations. Rev. Mr. Wilson preached in the evening from Heb. 8, 13. The sermon was an able exposition of the passage in question, and a clear and impressive presentation of the fact that the law of change is the law of progress, both in the natural and spiritual worlds, and that from this law the highest and grandest results have come, and still are coming.
