

# Eden Refuses Assurance Troops Will Leave Egypt

LONDON (Reuters) — Sir Anthony Eden refused to say Wednesday whether British troops would leave Egypt if the United Nations insists on excluding them from a proposed Middle East international police force.

"I do not think I could possibly give that assurance," the prime minister told the House of Commons. His statement was cheered by Conservative supporters, some of whom were still puzzled over whether to regard the Anglo-French cease-fire in Egypt as a victory for Eden's policy or a retreat.

Their doubts were increased by reports Wednesday that the cabinet was split Tuesday before Eden announced the cease-fire in Parliament.

RECEIVED ULTIMATUMS  
The Liberal evening newspaper The Star Wednesday front-pages a report that Eden had received

"what amounted to an ultimatum" from some of his senior cabinet colleagues led by R. A. Butler, lord privy seal and rated second most powerful figure in the government.

The group threatened to resign according to the unconfirmed reports, unless there was an immediate end to fighting in Egypt.

Eden told Parliament he was unable to give information about the discussions due to take place at the United Nations Wednesday night on the Egyptian situation.

But he said the government was with the Commonwealth governments, the United States and France, over the resolution coming before the UN.

Answering a question, Eden said:

"There is no question in our minds whatever of withdrawal by the United Kingdom or our allies (from Egypt) unless and until

there is a United Nations force to take over from them."

Diplomatic sources said that the composition of the Middle East police force now is one of the chief diplomatic issues following the cease-fire.

Already 12 nations, including Communist Romania and Czechoslovakia, have offered troops for the police force.

The sources said another key issue following the cease-fire is the declared intention of Israeli Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion to hold the territory his troops occupied during last week's attack on Egypt.

That covers the whole of the Sinai Peninsula, which is a part of Egypt.

The General Assembly in its Nov. 2 cease-fire resolution called for withdrawal of forces behind the 1949 armistice lines, ordering Israel to pull back.

# Snub Russians At Celebration

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada and most of the Western world Wednesday night officially snubbed Russia's big and glittery annual celebration. Officials said the boycott resulted from the Soviet blood bath in Hungary.

As usual, Soviet Ambassador Dmitri Chuvahin loaded his tables with luxurious foods and wines, expecting some 1,800 guests to help him celebrate the 39th anniversary of the Russian revolution.

The affair usually draws top government, diplomatic and military figures in this capital. But Prime Minister St. Laurent told reporters he would not attend and that Canada would not be officially represented.

Representatives — here of the United States, Britain, France, Australia, New Zealand and many other democracies said they also would stay away.

**PREPARE DEMONSTRATION**  
Hungarians quietly prepared for a demonstration in front of Ambassador Chuvahin's residence. The word was slipped out to top Canadian senior civil servants to boycott the affair.

The external affairs department said it would send only two junior officers in an unofficial capacity. The department sent out a telegram to Canadian diplomats at all overseas posts to keep clear of the celebration.

Informants said the boycott plan was in essence a decision of the NATO powers, taken after Russia refused to withdraw her forces from Hungary. Soviet butchery of freedom fighters there is reported to be continuing though the UN has condemned the massacre.

The official deep freeze contrasted with the situation a year ago when Mr. St. Laurent and part of his cabinet turned out to pay their respects.

Vodka, whiskey and crimean and georgian wine flowed freely. Giant turkeys and various Russian delicacies graced buffet tables in four crowded front rooms of the embassy.

But that old embassy burned down last New Year's Day. A new one now is under construction.
