Montague Man Severely Injured In Floor Collapse

Mr. William Collings, Montague, employee of Clark Bros., suffered a severe back injury Saturday morning when a floor on which he had been standing collapsed into a cellar.

Mr. Collings was delivering 12 squares of shingles at the home of Mrs. Annie Inman, Vernon. He completed unloading the truck of a home which Mrs. Inman was having repaired. After stacking the shingles, Mr. Collings and Mrs. Inman were standing near the centre of the floor when suddenly it collapsed under them, sending them into the cellar.

Mrs. Inman narrowly escaped injury, but suffered severe bruises and lacerations. Mr. Collings was found lying under several squares of shingles unable to move.

Mrs. Inman's daughter, who was present at the time, went for help at the home of Mr. Milton Furness, Vernon, who transported the injured to the King's County Hospital. Mr. Collings was found to have suffered a severe back injury, a possible fracture of a vertebra.

This is the second occasion that Mr. Collings has received such an injury. Several years ago while excavating a deep ditch, clay and stone fell in on Mr. Collings, burying him beneath a very heavy weight. On that occasion Mr. Collings was also hospitalized.

His many friends wish Mr. Collings a speedy recovery, and trust that he will suffer no complications from his unfortunate accident.

Magistrate's Court At Georgetown

Weekly Magistrate's Court was held in the Court House at Georgetown on Thursday, September 8th at 10:00 A.M. Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald, K.C., presided. In the first case a resident of Newport pleaded guilty to a charge of being in an intoxicated condition in a public place and was fined \$20.00 and costs or 30 days in jail. A resident of Launching pleaded guilty to unlawfully operating an unlicensed vehicle on the public highway. A fine of \$5.00 and costs or 10 days in jail was imposed.

A resident of St. Mary's Road appeared charged with common assault. Several witnesses were heard for the prosecution and several for the defence. Mr. J. J. Johnson of Charlottetown represented the accused. The case was adjourned for one week for judgment.

A Woodville Mills resident was fined \$50.00 and costs or in default to serve 30 days in jail for driving in a manner dangerous to the public. His operator's license was cancelled for nine months. The same party had sentence suspended for two years on a charge of "obstruction".

Mr. S. S. Hessian, K.C., Crown Prosecutor for King's County, represented the Crown. Court adjourned for one week.
