Let's Talk It Over

There is some talk in Summerside of reviving the Community Concerts which gave so much pleasure to music lovers in Prince County a few years ago. The concerts were discontinued, apparently because the financial burden of bringing down high class artists, even at bargain rates, was a little too heavy. We should think that Summerside has as high a percentage of music lovers as the average centre, but its population is small, and it was difficult to get enough patrons to keep the project on a sound financial basis.

The price of hearing renowned music singers and players is, of course, very low at these concerts, but, after all, any price is too high to pay for something you can't appreciate, and do not get any pleasure out of. Unfortunately, the music is all up in your Sunday best and coming to a community concert does not automatically make you a lover of good music. It sometimes takes a little time. We think the pictures featuring good music have a very good way of introducing the populace to musical top-soll. The good music is generally sandwiched in between bits of comedy or spirited action. This prevents the novices from getting musical indigestion, and they have a chance to learn to appreciate the best in music by slow and easy degrees.

The fare in community concerts is fine for those whose ears are already attuned, but a bit concentration, we think, for the would-be music lover. You can't find a better way to break into the musical world than to get some reciter. The more you play them, the more you will like them, which is perhaps one of the cardinal differences between classical music and the popular kind. The more you hear popular music, the less you like it. It doesn't have the quality possessed by the products of our great composers.

New \$70,000 Contract For S'side RCAF Station Awarded

A contract amounting to approximately \$70,000 has been awarded to the firm of M.F. Schurman for the construction of a pump house and water storage reservoir at R. C. A. F. Station, Summerside. Several months ago this firm was awarded a contract for the installation of a sewerage disposal system.

The new contract involves the construction of a prestressed concrete water tank with a capacity of 200,000 gallons, a pump house with installation of equipment and making the necessary connection to the existing mains.—S

Death at Borden Of Mrs. Nickerson

She was a member of the Ladies Social Club at Borden, and was much interested in the new church, sharing in its growth.

Besides her two daughters, she is survived by a brother, Alexander Morrison, Hartford, Conn., a sister, Mrs. Robert Thomson and two grandsons, Thomas Nelson Jardine and Murdoch Truman Morrison Jardine, both of Borden.

A funeral service was held in the United Church at Borden yesterday afternoon, conducted by Rev. Burton Crowe. A duet, "In the Garden" was rendered by Mrs. Hedley Lowther and Mrs. John Haggam. The pall bearers were, Harold Goggins, Reginald Rodgers, William Olson, Maurice Loidge, William Millington and Capt. Herb MacKenzie.

Today the remains will be taken by train to Sydney, N. S. where a funeral service will be held and burial will take place in the family plot in Hardwood Hill Cemetery.—L

Civic Election Today At Summerside

Today is civic election day in Summerside and people will go to the polls in the three wards in which the town of Summerside is divided, to choose one councillor and two water commissioners.

Only one councillor nominated in the East Ward and only one in the West Ward, and these men are therefore members of the council by acclamation. They are Donald Lidstone, councillor for the East Ward, and Andrew Perry, councillor for the West Ward.

In today's voting for the councillor to represent the Center Ward, citizens will choose between Dr. Hillard Clark and Mr. Norman Prichard.

Two water and sewerage commissioners will also be elected, one for a three-year term, and one for a two-year term. Citizens in all three wards will decide the issue in this department.

For the Water and Sewerage Commission for a three-year term they must choose between Robert B. Dewar, who is seeking re-election to the commission, and Elmer J. Nelson, who is running in opposition to Mr. Dewar.

For the two-year term they must decide between Mr. Roland Sheen and Mr. Cyrus Poirier, who have both been nominated to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Andrew Perry who resigned to nominate for the Town Council, after having served one year of his three-year term on the Water and Sewerage Commission. This leaves a period of two years that will be served by the winner in this contest.

In the Center Ward there are approximately 525 eligible voters, 800 in the East ward, and about 1225 in the West Ward.

The result of the voting is expected to be known early this evening.—S
