Black Hawks Down Detroit

The Chicago Black Hawks with the 'Golden Hawk' setting the pace staged a breathtaking comeback in the seventh game of their best-of-seven semi-final series at the Detroit Olympia Thursday night to advance to the Stanley Cup finals against Toe Blake and his band of 'Flying Frenchmen' in the spring classic.

The Prince of Wales trophy winners jumped into a 2-0 lead in the first period on goals from Ullman and Howe and appeared to be well on their way to a berth in the Stanley Cup finals when the siren went to end the opening stanza.

Bobby Hull scored his eighth goal of the series before the sandwich session had reached the half-way mark and this was the signal for the Billy Reay coached aggregation to spring to the attack. Doug Mohns beat Crozier before the close of the second period to put the Hawks on even footing with the home club going into the final frame.

Stan Mikita, who hadn't produced very well for the Hawks throughout the series, fired the winning goal for the Windy City squad at the mid-way mark of the third period and Eric Nesterenko put the icing on the cake when he blasted one past Roger Crozier after Hull had carried the puck into the Wings' zone and carried two defencemen out of position. This will mark the first time that Bobby Hull and company have had a berth in the Stanley Cup finals in four years.

This columnist thought the Wings showed signs of fatigue and inexperience in Thursday night's all important contest. Coach Sid Abel was using all his younger players on a regular shift and this doesn't pay off in a crucial game against an experienced club.

We would like to take this opportunity to offer our sincerest sympathies to 'Dinger' Johnson, president of the local chapter of the Detroit fan club as well as two of his executive members in the persons of Roy MacDonald and John Lane. We are calling the Hawks to beat the Canadiens in the finals.

Ron Turcotte Set For Derby

By KEN PRITCHARD NEW YORK (CP)—The stars in Ron Turcotte's eyes are glowing brighter than ever these days.

The 23-year-old Canadian jockey, who five years ago was a lumberjack in northern New Brunswick, has been assigned to ride Tom Rolfe, rated among the top three or four of the three-year-olds which will start in the Kentucky Derby May 1.

Turcotte, who has never seen a derby except on television, thinks he has a good chance to wind up in the winner's circle two weeks from Saturday.

Tom Rolfe is from the stable owned by Raymond Guest, U.S. ambassador to Ireland. He's rated a come-from-behind horse and Turcotte has a reputation as a "belly rider"—the type of jockey who refuses to admit his mount is beaten until the race is over. The combination may be dynamic.

Last Saturday at Laurel, Tom Rolfe and Turcotte came from behind to win the Chesapeake Stakes, making it three victories for Tom Rolfe in four starts this year. As the other Derby starters, Guest's three-year-old will run 1 1/4 miles for the first time May 1.

"Tom Rolfe hasn't been farther than a mile and one-sixteenth," Turcotte said this week. "But he likes to come from behind and has come from last in his three winning races this year. He's a smart horse, but he has a long stride."

Turcotte seems destined to be the main Canadian interest in the Derby this year. Last year, E. P. Taylor's Canadian-bred Northern Dancer was the big news, as it won the race and went on to capture the Preakness before being beaten in the Belmont stakes, the third of the famed triple-crown events for three-year-olds.

Taylor has a couple of Derby nominees this year—Native Victor and Victory Myth. But neither is likely to start.

Nor is Fyvelong, nominated by D. E. Weldon of London, Ont., and Tom Hays of Oakville, Ont., likely to start. Flying along finished fourth in the Flamingo Stakes in Florida.

Some U.S. trainers think Turcotte is the best jockey to come out of Canada in years. A tough and dedicated young man, he has ridden more than 700 winners for purses totalling more than \$2,500,000. EARNED \$170,000

Born into a large French-Canadian family July 22, 1941, the five-foot-one, 110-pound Turcotte in 1964 earned about \$170,

000 in jockey fees and purse shares the jockey customarily gets 10 per cent of the purse.

Turcotte's first job in the field which has brought him financial success was with Windfield Farm, owned by Taylor. Farm manager Joe Thomas hired him to clean stalls and walk horses at 18.

He rejected an apprentice contract with Taylor, and signed with stable owner Gordon Huntley. But he failed to win on 14 months in 1961.

At Fort Erie, April 9, 1962, he broke his maiden aboard Pheasant Ring. He had 825 mounts that year, of which 180 won, 148 placed second, and 128 were third.

In 1963 he was up 1,135 times, with 263 first, 172 seconds and 141 thirds. By arrangement with Huntley he began free-lance riding in the U.S. in the fall of 1963.

He was on his way. In 1964 he rode 1,462 mounts. He was first 250 times, second 219 and third 215 and earned \$1,292,264 for the owners of the horses he rode. He had 50 winners last October and November at Aqueduct track here.

He went on to Florida for the winter and although given only ordinary horses to ride, picked up a number of winners.

Now that he's nailed down a job riding Tom Rolfe, his fortunes may be ready to soar to even greater heights.

Montreal's Charlie Hodge Gets Opening Assignment

By AL McNEIL MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal coach Toe Blake sums up the key to his Canadiens' Stanley Cup final series against Chicago Black Hawks in three words: Stop Bobby Hull.

Blake, said Friday as his charges went through a final 50-minute workout for tonight's series-opener at the Forum: "Stopping Hull is a tough job. He had a good year against us and it's pretty hard to defend against a guy who's on the ice as-much-as-he-is."

As a starter, Blake said he will assign rightwinger Claude Provost, the semi-final hero whose overtime goal Tuesday eliminated the defending cup champion Toronto Maple Leafs, to shadow the Hawks' blonde bomber.

"We'll use Provost against him at home. But (Billy) Reay may have some other ideas when we get to Chicago."

Blake, as coach of the home team, will have the final say in aligning line-up against-line at the Forum. In Chicago, however, the last move will be up to Reay.

Hull, who set the regular National Hockey League season on fire for the first half, only to run into a succession of knee troubles during the final 35 games, enters the best-of-seven final in the midst of one of his patented goal-scoring sprees.

Hawks Defeat Red Wings Meet Canadiens In Finals

DETROIT (CP) — Bobby Hull combined with Chicago's scouter line to lead the Black Hawks to a 4-2 win over Detroit Red Wings Thursday night and give them a berth in the Stanley Cup finals for the first time in four years.

The seventh and final game of the best-of-seven set saw Hull register his eighth goal of the series, enabling him to tie the record for most goals in a semi-final, held jointly by himself, Jerry Toppazzini and Gordie Howe.

Stan Mikita, Doug Mohns and Eric Nesterenko were the other scorers for Chicago.

Norm Ullman, with his sixth of the series, and Howe, with his fourth, counted for the Wings.

The Hawks will open their best-of-seven final series against the Canadiens in Montreal Saturday night, the seventh time the Hawks have been in the finals since the National Hockey League's inauguration in 1927. They last won the cup in 1961, Montreal made it to the finals by defeating defending Stanley Cup champion Toronto Maple Leafs in six games.

TRAILED 2-0 The Hawks were trailing 2-0 Thursday night at the end of the opening frame and appeared to have left all their fight in Chicago. The Wings dominated the period for the full 20 minutes and it looked as if they were headed for an easy victory.

However, Hull counted at the 8:52 mark of the second period and changed the complexion of the game. His goal seemed to set fire to the Hawks and they continued to gain momentum until they were all over the Wings.

Mohns tied the score at 18:09 of the period and the goal seemed to take all the fight out of a tired Detroit club.

Mikita, the NHL scoring champ this season, registered his third of the series at 9:42 and Nesterenko, with his second, scored the insurance marker to
