She had a lovely coil at foot, and another brood mare we saw was Ann Clegg 2:06, the dam of Ann's Boy 4, 2:14 1/2, that as a four-year-old last year won nine dashes and was sold for a long price in the fall. For this season's racing he has a four-year-old pacer that showed up well as a three-year-old last season, also a two-year-old and a three-year-old. Both these are entered in the stakes. And last but not least a four-year-old trotter that shows real speed. As a breeder and developer of sound, large horses we don't think George can be beaten and as regarding speed one has only to remember that for several years now he has been turning out a top performer.

Horsemen are reminded that June 15th is the closing date for stakes that will be raced Old Home Week, particulars of which have appeared on this page and on forms sent out by the Charlottetown Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Association. Letters dated to Monday noon with entries will be okay. The stakes carry good purses and afford excellent opportunity for our many classy trotters and pacers to win money.

One of the biggest bargains of the 1950 auctions at Lexington, Ky., was Sharp Note, a Walnut Hall Farm yearling that sold for \$1,000. This spring at Santa Anita she won the \$10,500 Western Trot for three-year-old trotters with ease in 2:02 4/5 with the final quarter in 28 3/5. It is said to be the fastest quarter ever negotiated by a three-year-old in May and it was a new record for the State and the third fastest mile of the year for a trotter of any age. Sharp Note's sire was Phonograph 4, 1:59 1/4, and his dam Rosemary Hanover 4, 2:07 3/4. Phonograph was an excellent race horse and after his turf career was placed in the stud at Walnut Hall Farm but for some reason or other he did not beget early speed and was sold for a very moderate price to a breeder in New York State, where he is now in the stud.

Frank Acoorn, race secretary of the Charlottetown Driving Park, was in Summerside Thursday and had a look over the horses being trained at the track there. He saw Edna's Boy, a two-year-old owned by Mr. Sadler of Maine, step a mile in 2:49. Another horse he liked was the three-year-old Coal Dust, owned by Mr. Hayman, and he was particularly taken with Rev. William Monaghan's two-year-old pacer that was a mile in 2:42. Mannister Direct 2:05 has been miles in 2:25 with last halves in 1:10. He is owned by Dewar Bros., Summerside. Alan Mac 2:14 2/5, owned by Arthur Clarke and others, has been a mile in 2:24. A three-year-old pacer owned by Leslie Simmons, out of Ruby Volo, daughter of Ruby P. 2:04 3/4, is training very nicely as is also Bonnie Frisco, owned by Horne & Clarke, and last but not least is the five-year-old pacer Abner the Great 2:11 2/5, owned by James Heffel, that stepped the fastest mile to date—2:21—with the half in 1:07 and last quarter in 31 seconds. The above are in the stable of the well known trainer, George Sobey, who has developed so many good trotters and pacers in past years.

The Andrew Perry stable is being handled by Pat McKenna, who has been out of the game for a few years but is making a comeback and doing well with his charges. They are Lucky Penny, a 30-class pacer that has been a mile in 2:35 with the last half in 1:15. The trotter Joey Dale, that is a full brother of Tartan 2:16 4/5, has trotted in 2:25 with the last half in 1:09. The four-year-old pacer Dorothy F. has been given slow miles and her last performance was in 2:40 with the last half in 1:18. An excellent trotting prospect is the two-year-year-old Winnifred G., that has been in 2:52 and is beautifully gaited. The above are

all owned by Andrew Perry. John Harkness is training the green pacer Bonnie Maise, and a two-year-old colt by Jollity 2:05 1/4. For Dr. Delaney, Roy MacDonald is training Patchen Volo 2nd, 2:09 2/5, and he is up to a mile in 2:25 with the last half in 1:07 and came home the last quarter in 31 2/5. Another member of the stable is the three-year-old trotter Sandy Squire, owned by Reg Sonier.

Saint John, N.B. Exhibition Association plan to make Exhibition Park a real sport center this summer with harness racing and other activities. The racing will be under the lights. The opening meet was last Tuesday night commencing at 7:30 and there was a large attendance of spectators. Class A was won by Bonus Abbe, owned by Lloyd McKinney, Galetown, with 1-1, time, 2:35. The Class B was won by Sandy Mar, owned and driven by T. Legere, with 1-1, time for the mile, 2:27 2/5. Class C was won by Buddy Clegg, owned by Hymie MacArthur, Shediac, with 1-1, time, 2:25. Class D was won by Bud Abner, owned and driven by D. M. Lawson, Saint John, with 1-1, time for the half mile 1:11 4/5 and the mile 2:24.

In a telephone message from P. J. Cadogan, now in Boston, to E. Frank Tynes, the following summaries of the Cadogan horses in Thursday night's events at Foxboro track were given: Cobblestone, 1-4, time, 2:10 1/5, a reduction of one second in Cobblestone's record. He was driven by Worrell Lewis. In the fast class pace Lucky Chief was 7, time, 2:06, and for the fast trot Annie Scott finished 4-7.

During the week the Maritimes lost two of its staunchest supporters of horse racing, James T. Waite of Traversville, Rest, and Aubrey Blanchard Harvey of Windsor, N.S. Mr. Waite was a great lover of horses and years ago in an effort to improve the breed he imported from the United States the pacer stallion Premier Witte and later the beautiful and splendidly bred Catalon by Bingen. The blood of both of these horses flows through quite a number of our good race horses, but it was Bud Axworthy 2:14 that has really left a great impression. He was a full brother of the world's champion trotter, at that time Lee Axworthy 1:58 1/4 and was equally fast on the pace. Mr. Waite attended nearly all our race meets until he was incapacitated and just a few years ago the writer had the privilege of a long conversation with him which was greatly enjoyed.

Mr. Aubrey Blanchard Harvey was widely known throughout the Maritimes for his connection with race horses and he had many good ones during his lifetime, among them Friar 2:09 1/4 and Billy P.C. Parker 2:11 4/5. He spent the early part of the day he was stricken at Windsor track, exercising his horses and he was in the act of harnessing another horse at home when he suffered a heart attack from which he failed to recover. To the sorrowing relatives and friends we extend our sincere sympathy.

(Continued from page 6) fishing and hunting dams is speeded up, the minimum quota should be set at twenty dams per year. In a few years the province will be dotted with private and semi-private dams. While this will have a greatly beneficial effect on the general scheme of things just how it will react on the moral of the rank and file of hunters and fishermen is a moot question. The ordinary outdoorsman has a strong aversion to No Hunting and Fishing signs. Then again unless some restrictions are placed upon certain areas it will be hunted and fished out and the ultimate result will be the same... No Hunting or Fishing. The sponsoring of Crow Shooting Contests, and the payment of 15c per pair of feet by the Department concerned during the course of those contests, has done a lot, and will do more, to improve our waterfowl and upland game shooting. In the past hunters expended their shooting energy on gamebirds, particularly ducks, and let the crow propagate in peace. The result was that the crows increased and the ducks slipped down the scale and there were more crows to hunt less duck eggs and ducklings.

A hunter would make a resolution to shoot two crows for every duck he bagged the balance on the wildlife scale would soon
