Through the centre of the cow pasture ran one of the cutest little brooks you ever saw. And believe me, folks, that stream was chock full of the nicest speckled trout you ever looked at, many of them almost as long as a small child's arm, or maybe just a little shorter. Anyway, they were great fish and there was no end to them. No one knows better than I, for along with my brothers I fished that little stream from its mouth clean down to where it emptied into the mill-dam. What's more, we fished it every week day and on the Sabbath too, though Granddad said we would never go to Heaven if we fished on Sunday. But we were too young then to think much of heaven, as we sneaked away every Sunday after Sunday school and strung our catch on maple switches and sunk them under the water to keep them from the eyes of Granddad and to keep them fresh until we picked them up Monday and added them to that day's catch.

Sometimes we laid our fishing tackle aside to build miniature dams across the stream. Often on hot days we'd plunge into that ice cold water in the raw and come out with our flesh almost purple from the cold. Yet strange to say, I can never remember taking a cold because of these sudden and perhaps foolish submersions.

That little brook was our land of fantasy, our place of escape when the days were hot and long; our haven of refuge when Granddad needed us most to do some chore. I still love that little brook. I can still see our cattle drinking deep of its crystal water and cooling their heels at the same time. But if the brook was a blessing to us boys, it was sort of a curse to Granddad, or so he thought, because he had so much trouble trying to keep us away from its enchantment.

Granddad was quite a spinner of yarns in his own right, so one night when we asked him to tell us a story he began by telling us the brook was haunted. "Yes, sire," he said. "That thar creek is the haunt of the strangest critters one ever did see—ghosts, goblins and warlocks and—"

"Did you ever see them, Granddad?" I asked. "See 'em, why bless your soul, boy, I've not only seen 'em but I've had to run from 'em more than once to keep a whole skin." "Then Granddad had to put in her ear, vowed she'd seen Fairies drifting down the brook on leaves and singing happy little tunes. She'd always end her fairy yarns by saying what nice little folk the Fairies are. Never do any harm to anybody who don't harm them.

So we kept right on doing the things that came naturally—fishing, bathing and what not—till the time Granddad dressed up in Granddad's nightgown and put the fear of the Lord into our young hearts when he climbed a tree beside the brook and spoke to us in a deep disguised voice.
