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## Wholesale Hardware Firm Opens For Business In City

The Maritimes only strictly chain wholesale hardware business, R.M.A. Wholesale Ltd. opened for business recently on Belmont Street in Charlottetown.  
The building has a railway siding at the back and is used for the wholesaling of hardware, which includes building supplies, regular hardware, glass kitchen ware, and small wares.  
It is a corporate business, owned by a large number of retailers and contractors on Prince Edward Island. The business is managed by Clayton MacLeod, Charlottetown who is assisted by Warren Gregory, Parkdale. President of the firm is W. M. Ellis, Sherwood and secretary is Joe Zakem, Charlottetown.  
The building is 50 feet by 70 feet with a ground floor and complete basement. It is to be used solely for hardware wholesale purposes and is catering to the needs of general stores, all retailers and contractors on P.E.I.  
Mr. Ellis believes that with the railway siding and a ramp at the front, combined with no delivery service, the firm will be able to handle Island needs in the hardware department.

## School Zoning Regulations Described Minimum Change

The new zoning regulations released Thursday for city children attending elementary schools throughout a minimum of change from the original zoning. Dr. K.A. Parker, superintendent of city schools, said this morning.  
The matter of religion has nothing to do with the zoning, he said, and the 50-year traditional constituencies with children of each religion attending certain schools remains unaltered.  
Technically, however, any parent living near one of the schools has the right to enroll his child in that school if he wishes to do so.  
The new locations of West Kent School and Queen Square (St. Jean) School are the main change for the new zoning. The major change is the introduction of grade one and two boys into Rockford Square School, a move indicated by the distance of some families from the new St. Jean School.  
In all, not more than 10 per cent of families are affected by the new regulations, he added.

## Harbor Patrol Said Needed Following Near Drownings

Chief MacArthur who has had some definite ideas on this subject for the past few years, said that the near triple fatality of last Sunday night has brought things to a head and should prompt a substantial argument in favor of the formation of such a harbor patrol.  
Chief MacArthur stated that now that he has presented his views to a committee of the police committee, it has now been placed in the hands of the government and the City Council. It is to attempt to fight for the formation of the patrol.  
In accepting the chief's view, Mr. Nicholson presented the chief that it will be brought before the police committee, as soon as possible after the return to the city of the chairman William McNeill.

## Yanks Nip Angels 6-3

NEW YORK (AP)—Ace New York left-hander Whitey Ford won his tender shoul-der, tossed a solid four-hitter and led the second-place Yankees to a 6-3 victory over Los Angeles Angels Friday night.  
Ford, who pitched seven innings of ball before retiring with an injured shoulder the last time he faced the Angels, May 23, was in major trouble only once this time—and that was his own doing.  
The Yankees held a 3-1 lead and Whitey was working a two-hitter before Leon Wagner singled and Rob Rodgers tripped in the seventh. Felix Turrentine hit a ground ball back to the box, but Ford couldn't find the ball finally, retrieving the ball and throwing wild to the plate as he fell heavily on the attempt to throw out Rodgers.  
Rodgers scored easily with the tying run, but Whitey got out of it without trouble the rest of the way, and the Yankees not the winner in the next half inning on a single by Tom Fresh, a walk to Bobby Richardson and a couple of infield outs.
