## Parents Worried Over Son Who May Become Alcoholic

Dear Mary Haworth: I too write a column of advice; but in a dilemma I also find it necessary to get others' opinions, for I am not self-sufficient, especially where a beloved son is concerned. I have a wonderful son—handsome, intelligent, a real nice kid. He has many, many friends who hang around our house all the time. The phone is ringing constantly and so is the door bell. You wouldn't think I had a problem, would you? But the other evening Bud, who is only 17, was out with a couple of his friends; and came in at midnight, staggering. He had been driving; and they had gone across the state line so they could drink. His father and I were very much upset because (1) he was doing the driving; (2) he is so young to be starting this sort of thing; (3) I was married before to an alcoholic, and have a complex on youthful drinking. FAMILY LIQUOR IS DISAPPEARING This isn't the first time he's had too much to drink; and liquor is disappearing in our house — noticeable because we seldom drink; and then only one or two cocktails if we have guests. Are we making a mountain out of a molehill? We pride ourselves on being understanding and tolerant; but we also think we see danger ahead. I can't trust my own feelings. My son says "all the kids drink" — you just aren't one of the gang if you don't. I want Bud to have a mind of his own and not be a sheep; but he'd rather have the approbation of his friends. To be one of the gang seems more important to him than anything else. The kids he goes with all come from nice homes. What is the matter? Too much, too soon? I am afraid he will become an alcoholic. How can I prevent this? A. R. LIFE LACKS DIRECTION Dear A. R.: What is the matter, you ask—too much, too soon? On the contrary, too little, and too late, I think, on the score of education for living. As I get the picture, Bud and his friends have no true concepts about what they are living for—either in terms of Now, or over the Long Haul. Insofar as they know, or feel, they are just bodies (or "selves") in search of diversion, in herd activities, during waking hours. You don't mention a thing worthwhile that Bud may be doing—not even studying interestedly, with a life-work in mind. His goal, and yours (unconsciously) for him, seems to be social acceptance by "nice people" (meaning the so-called better class) — with door bell ringing, phone buzzing, everybody wanting Bud. CHART OUTLINES ALCOHOLIC PHASES So he has this (but at what price?) — and you boast naively: "One wouldn't think I had a problem." Thus disclosing your foggy theory that a person enmeshed in a web of popularity and a round of frolic is really living—"has it made," as the phrase is. Evidence indicates that Bud is incipiently alcoholic. Turn to Page 21 of James Lamb Free's book "Just One More: Concerning The Problem Drinker" (Coward-McCann). Here is a chart outlining "the first phase of alcoholism"—the first phase, the second (crucial) phase, and the third (chronic) phase. Bud is in the first phase at present—sneaking drinks, preoccupation with drinking, gulping drinks, evasive about drinking," etc. As to why he is in trouble with alcohol—maybe he is allergic to it; one of those who can't handle it. There are such people—who have to leave it alone or go under. HERE'S GUIDANCE IF HE'LL USE IT Also Bud probably needs help in getting his bearings. He needs to "find himself" — needs to discover an absorbing long range purpose for his living; and to develop deeply self-assured knowledge in organizing his efforts to achieve his aims. Maybe his parents are pretty light weight. If Bud's mind is open to help,

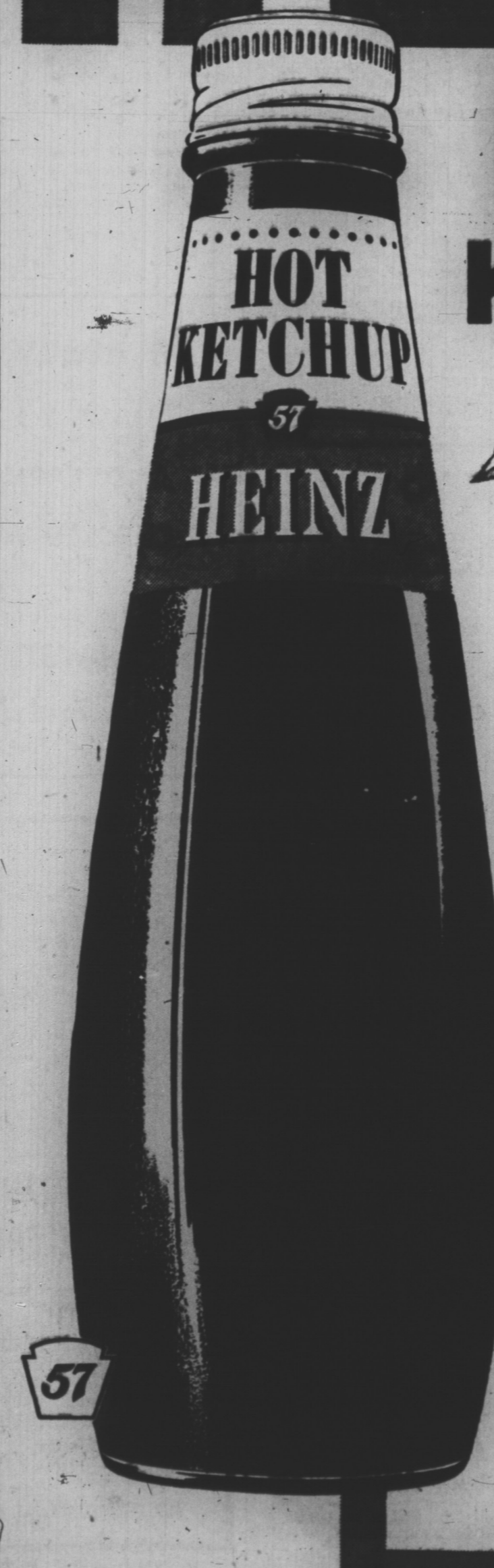
