

Habs Blank Detroit 1-0; Leafs And New York Win

The Montreal Canadiens edged closer to the National Hockey League lead Saturday night with Jean Beliveau's first period goal in a second-place tie with Boston Bruins, routed 3-2 at Toronto by the Maple Leafs in a rousing Saturday night battle.

At New York the Rangers made their debut on television—the Columbia Broadcasting System's national network — by clubbing Chicago Black Hawks 4-1 Saturday afternoon at Madison Square Garden.

The victory over the second-place Boston club lifted Toronto into a tie for the No. 4 spot with New York Rangers.

Centres George Armstrong and Brian Cullen and left winger Sid Smith were the Toronto marksmen. The Boston goals were by defenceman Alan Stanley and left winger Red Chevrefils.

The Leafs who lost 2-0 decisions to Chicago and Detroit in their previous starts, opened the scoring after about seven minutes' play, Armstrong batting in a backhand shot.

SMITH IS DECOY
Less than two minutes later Brian Cullen using Smith as a decoy on the opposite wing, beat goalie Terry Sawchuk with a long, low shot from along the boards.

Even Sawchuk got in some rough stuff late in the game, showing an elbow into Ron Stewart's face as the Leaf winger sped by the net.

Smith notched what proved to be the winning goal at 3:47 of the final period, fooling Sawchuk with a knee-high shot on a breakaway.

Beliveau's goal at Montreal, his 22nd of the season, lifted the 13,770 fans into a roar of excitement that lasted until the final siren.

The big Montreal centre grabbed the puck in his own end and went straight down the middle, flanked by his wings. He split the Detroit defence of Red Kelly and Al Arbour, flipping the puck just past them, and sped in to beat goalie Glen Hall with a short lift shot.

HALL, PLANTE STAR
The first game was replete with sharp, highly effective checking and brilliant out-tending by both Hall and Montreal's Jacques Plante. It was Plante's sixth shut-out of the season—his first since Nov. 4. Plante had 30 shots to handle and Hall 31.

There was comparatively little rough work despite the solid, rugged checking. Each team drew seven minor penalties.

Gordie Howe of the Wings was well checked and seldom dangerous. The closest calls Plante had came from shots by Alex Delvecchio, Metro Prystay and Norm Ullman. The Richard brothers, Maurice and Henri, and Dickie Moore gave Hall some dangerous moments.

At New York, Ranger coach Phil Watson, who reunited last season's top-scoring line of Andy Bathgate, Larry Popein and Dean Prentice for the NHL's U. S. network debut, was rewarded by an outstanding performance by Bathgate, who scored the first New York goal and assisted on two more.

The last-place Hawks who have knocked over every other NHL club in the course of an upsurge in recent weeks, still found the Rangers unbeatable, trailing all the way after Bathgate scored midway through the opening period.

Popein made it 2-0 in the second period but Glen Skov kept the Hawks in the game by poking the puck home from a scramble in the opening seconds of the final frame.

The Rangers sewed up the game with two quick goals in the final minute by Bruce Cline and Danny Lewicki.

In the freshening fixture, the Juveniles had to come from behind a 3-0 deficit in the first period to earn their victory. Before the 10-minute mark of the first period was reached the airmen had built up a 3-0 lead but had to settle for a 4-3 lead at the end of the first as the Abbies struck back hard for three goals.

GOING INTO BUSINESS

Jackie Robinson Says He Is Quitting Game "Forever"

NEW YORK (AP) — Jackie Robinson, major league baseball's first Negro player and one of its greatest stars for 10 seasons, says in a copyrighted article for Look Magazine that he is quitting the game "forever" to enter private business in an effort to gain security for his family.

Robinson who last Dec. 13 was traded by Brooklyn Dodgers to New York Giants writes that the trade had nothing to do with his decision.

The controversial 38-year-old Robinson Sunday explained his secret—and replied to a statement in a local newspaper in which Buzzie Bavasi, vice-president of the Dodgers, is quoted as saying Jackie betrayed newspaper men by giving the magazine exclusive rights to his retirement announcement.

The latest development in the Robinson retirement story, which will appear under Jackie's byline in Tuesday's issue of Look, squashed hopes by the Giants that he would play for them this season.

"THROUGH WITH IT"
"I'm through with baseball—through with it forever," Jackie said. "I have no regrets — only pleasant memories—and neither has my wife, Rachel."

"The only thing I am sorry about, is that I had to keep my decision a secret from my friends among the newspaper men. They may feel I haven't been honest about my future. But I couldn't tell them, nor could I tell Mr. Stoneham, because I had agreed to write this story for Look a long time ago."

Robinson received \$50,000 in a package deal with the magazine. Robinson said he had taken a job as vice-president in charge of personnel relations with a New York restaurant chain Chock-

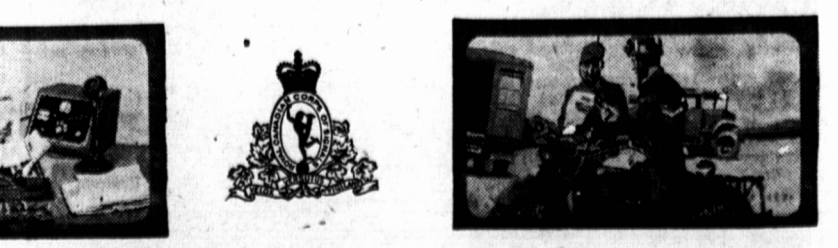

UNBEATEN IN 5

Canadiens Edge NY Rangers 3-2

NEW YORK (CP) — Montreal Canadiens extended their unbeaten string to five games Sunday with a 3-2 National Hockey League victory over New York Rangers.

The defending champions' winning goal was scored by Dickie Moore with less than eight minutes remaining in the spirited, fight-filled game.

Moore's tally came at 12:11 while the Rangers' bad man, Lou Fontinato, was in the penalty box for holding. Moore picked up Doug Earvey's rebound and calmly plunked it into the nets while Gump Worsley, the New York goalie, was down on the ice.

Only the efforts of Danny Lewicki kept the Rangers in a challenging position. He scored both of his team's goals.

Montreal, which has won four and tied one of its last five starts, moved into a 1-0 lead on Maurice Richard's score at 3:39 of the second period. Seven minutes later, Lewicki climaxed a power play by beating Jacques Plante to tie the count.

The Canadiens quickly regained the lead at 11:46 as Boom Boom Geoffrion took passes from Don Marshall and Harvey and lifted the disc over Worsley into the cage.

The Rangers made it 2-2 at 1:22 of the final session on Lewicki's

second goal. The flashy left winger scored from 10 feet out.

The crowd of 14,806 saw Fontinato and Bert Olmstead of Montreal throw haymakers in the second period and Henri Richard of the Canucks and Bill Gadsby of New York mix it up in the third. All four were handed major penalties for fighting.

Jean Beliveau, the league's point-scoring leader, was a victim of the fast action. The Canadiens' centre sustained a badly bruised left hip bone and remained on the sidelines in the last half of the game.
