Flu Vaccine Deliveries Slow

HALIFAX (CP)—Deputy Health Minister Dr. J. S. Robertson said Friday Nova Scotia has received only 400 of the 20,000 doses of Asian flu vaccine originally scheduled for delivery by Oct. 6. The 400 doses arrived here Thursday. Additional shipments are expected next week, he said. The health department was notified last week by Toronto's Connaught Laboratories that technical difficulties would delay vaccine deliveries and that the province's initial quota will be drastically cut. Dr. H.B. Colford chairman of the province's advisory committee on influenza, said vaccination will be given on a priority basis to doctors, nurses, and people in essential jobs. Most hospitals in Halifax have already purchased vaccines for their staffs. The city of Halifax has obtained enough to vaccinate the staffs of its hospitals and the city home, public health nurses and some members of the police force and health department. Health commissioner Dr. A. R. Morton said Friday the city still plays an essential role. So far no cases of influenza in Nova Scotia have been diagnosed as the Asian variety, but health department official said Friday there could well be cases of Asian flu in the province.

Canada's New Hydrofoil Boat Gets Tests In Bedford Basin

HALIFAX (CP)—Canada's new hydrofoil boat made preliminary test runs in Bedford Basin here Friday. The 59-foot craft — named the Bras d'Or is being tested here by the defence research board's naval establishment. Scores of motorists saw the boat skimming back and forth on the basin, the inner arm of Halifax harbor. Many of them stopped to watch. The boat whipped up plumes of spray as it moved over the surface at high speed. The hydrofoil will make more test runs during the next month, it was learned. It may be developed for use as a high-speed air rescue craft and as a replacement for small naval vessels. The Bras d'Or weighs 17½ tons. It is built of aluminum and has three hydrofoil units of about the same size—two on either side of the hull near the bow and the third at the stern, where it also serves as a rudder. The carrier Bona venture brought the boat here from Britain last June. It was launched in April from the Isle of Anglesey shipyard. Each hydrofoil unit has several V-shaped blades mounted be-

tween side struts. The water lifts the blades as the boat's speed increases. The hull rides entirely above the surface at about 20 knots and at a maximum speed is about 3½ feet above water. This is the second hydrofoil craft the naval research establishment has tested here. The first was the Massawippi. It was developed here and was a 5½-ton 45-foot boat. The name of the second boat comes from the Bras d'Or Lakes in Cape Breton Island, where telephone inventor Alexander Graham Bell experimented with hydrofoil boats early in the century.

NEW LIGHTS FOR FALLS NIAGARA FALLS, Ont. (CP)—A new illuminating system providing 10 times more light than the present floodlights is planned at Niagara Falls. A \$154,000 contract has been awarded to Amalgamated Electric Corporation Limited, an associate of General Electric Company Limited of England. Five basic colors with 15 combinations will provide a large range of dramatic lighting effects on the falls.

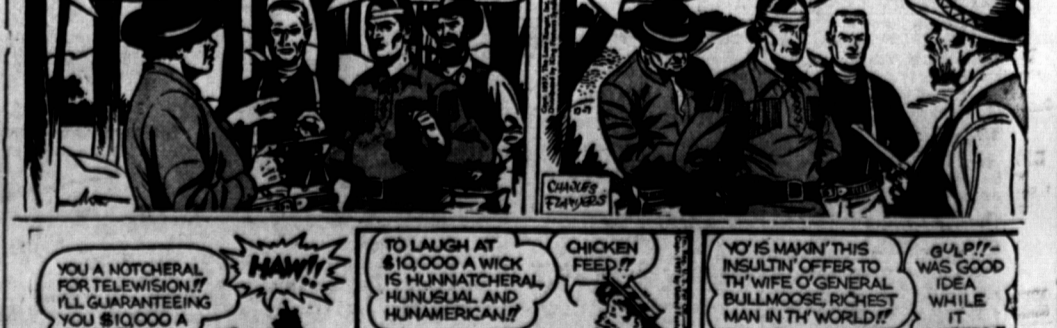
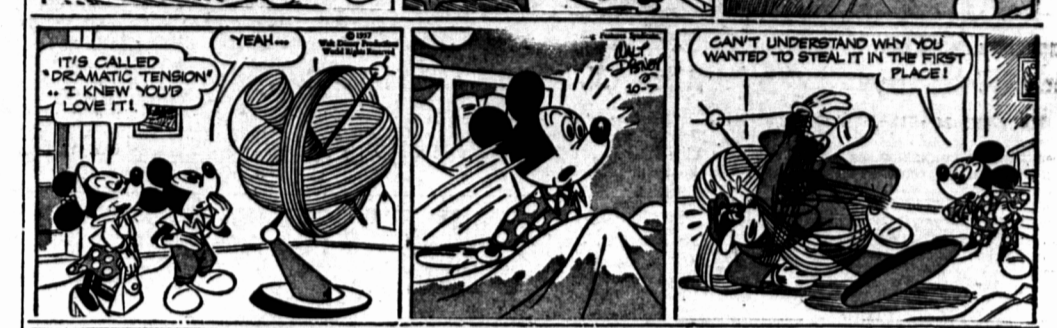

The bidding: North East South West 1♣ Pass 1♠ 1♥ 2♦ Pass 4♣ Pass. FAMOUS HANDS Opening lead—queen of hearts. This hand appeared many years ago in a par contest. The bidding shown is not the best possible, considering that three notrump played by South is unobtainable. In all fairness, though, it is somewhat difficult to arrange the bidding so that South, with his singleton heart, becomes declarer at three notrump. It can be worked out, seeing both the North and South cards, but it is much easier to do in retrospect than at the table. Flu On Wane In Some Areas, Intensifies In Other Places

By THE ANADIAN PRESS The flu virus continues to attack Canadians in widely separated parts of the country but in some areas it is gradually disappearing. Health officials in Timmins in Northern Ontario and in Calgary said Friday the flu epidemic is on the wane. However, in Montreal, city health director Dr. Adelard Groulx warned of a possible flu epidemic in two or three weeks. "We now have 15-to-16-per-cent absenteeism in schools and two per cent in industry and business," he said. "In two or three weeks the percentage will increase."
