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Thoughts For Our Time

In such things as splendid and military isolation, no more than parts of the body have meaning or perfection isolated from the whole.

The pattern for world reform is as simple as it is ancient. Prayer and personal goodness. Why should we shout against Communism when the way of life we offer is so shoddy? Is it reasonable to replace the evils of Godless totalitarianism with the evils of Godless democracy, where there are economic injustice, political compromise, betrayal of nations, divorce, birth control, and corruption in high places? Pravda cries for the abolition of God; but democracy ignores His existence.

Of course no one would think of substituting slavery for freedom, unless he had forgotten what it means to be free, or unless he had grown careless of this precious jewel. I suggest that we are today in this very danger, and for these very reasons. We enjoy a freedom which through comfort and prosperity so often becomes license, and so we do what we want to do, instead of what we should do. But to abuse freedom is to destroy freedom. To forget about God and His law is to court slavery. Not to be concerned with personal goodness, and with removing the evil from our own soul, is to act an injustice to ourselves and to our fellowman.

If the scene on the banks of the St. Lawrence produces hope in one's heart, it also produces a painful yearning for the millions who seldom think of God and who are so very little concerned with loving Him. And yet the love of God and the spotless life are the only really important things in the world. For the people who pray will sooner or later pass away; the St. Lawrence itself will perish at some time; but God will remain without change, to reward those who love Him and to punish those who do not.

side Fire Department. Some machinery and a milking machine were lost in the fire and a few hens and geese are believed to have perished in the blaze. Fortunately no livestock was lost as the ten milk cows were in the pasture and the two horses were being used to haul in the grain, and a calf and two pigs were moved to safety from the buildings.

Both side lofts of the barn were filled with fifty tons of hay and two more loads of grain would have completed filling the centre loft with straw yesterday at which time Mr. MacArthur intended to thresh the remaining crop of grain in the field.

Ironically enough, the tractor and thresher had been placed outside the barn as a precaution against fire.

Members of the Summerside Fire Department assisting in the work of fire fighting yesterday included Chief Abdon Arsenault, Laurier Peters, Heath Warren, Albert Leard and Jack Schurman.

A large 600 gallon tank truck owned by Colin Waugh of Wilmet Valley assisted in supplying water to the Summerside Fire Department pumper truck as did several smaller trucks and even garden hoses. Mr. Albert Waugh, who was enroute to a nearby potato field with a sprayer full of potato spray mix, arrived at the scene of the fire and in spraying the side of the garage owned by Mr. Bagole on an adjoining property was instrumental in saving the building.

It was reported by persons at the fire yesterday that a straw blower being used in an open field recently on the farm of Albert Matheson of Reid's Corner, had ignited the straw stack in a manner similar to yesterday's destructive fire. However, as there were no buildings nearby in this case no serious damage resulted.

This might serve to cause farmers to inspect the moving parts of their straw blowers to make sure there is no friction of the metal blades against any other metal in the machine.
