HALIFAX, (CP)—The Dominion Weather Office here says a weak disturbance moving eastward through Maine is forecast to cross the Maritimes Monday, but it will be followed by another weak disturbance, and clear weather is forecast to reach only the north-western part of the district.

Prince Edward Island, eastern N. B. counties: Cloudy with scattered showers Monday; warmer, light winds; low-high at Charlottetown and Moncton 40 and 60.
