

Former Vaudeville Performer Dies

NEW YORK, April 18—(AP)—Herman Timberg, 60, who had appeared as a vaudeville performer throughout the United States, died yesterday. He had important roles on Broadway in "The Passing Show of 1921," his own "Herman Timberg's Frolics of 1922" and "Tick-Tak-Toe," the latter a 1943 musical revue for which he also provided the words and music.
