### Canadian Proposal Was Given Sympathetic Hearing At Talks

**TUCKER'S TOWN, Bermuda (CP)**—A Canadian proposal in the United Nations regarding nuclear tests has received a sympathetic hearing from British and American leaders here.

In a communique issued Sunday at the end of their conference, Prime Minister Macmillan and President Eisenhower agreed to register with the UN advance notice of their intention to conduct future nuclear tests, and to permit limited international observation of these tests if Russia would do the same.

In a recent session of the UN General Assembly Canada, Norway and Japan proposed that advance notice of nuclear test be given the UN.

### Post Letters In Antarctica

**HAMILTON, Ont. (CP)**—One of the first letters posted from the Antarctic continent has reached Hamilton.

It was probably among postage in the first regular British mail to leave the South Polar seas, Arthur Chrystal, the receiver, conjectured.

On the letter are four stamps postmarked Ross Dependency, Jan. 11, 1957.

The letter was taken with the New Zealand trans-Antarctic expedition under the command of Sir Edmund Hillary to Scott Base, Ross Dependency. The expedition is part of the International Geophysical Year's explorations in Antarctica.

### 20 B. C. Doctors Appeal Tax

**VANCOUVER (CP)** — Twenty doctors have launched an appeal before an income tax appeal board against a federal revenue department's claim that they had received \$390,000 in "kickbacks" on eye-glass prescriptions during the last 10 years.

The case opened Monday and is expected to last about two weeks.

The doctors claim the money was non-taxable capital gain on shares in Prescription Optical Co. Ltd.

The government assessments on what the Crown layers described as "secret commissions" or "kickbacks" range from \$4,488 to \$54,754 a doctor since 1947.

The government claimed a conspiracy between the doctors and several optical firms "in fraud of the government of Canada to arrange a purported sale of shares . . . and to represent the said money as capital receipts, whereas the money received by the appellants as a result of the said conspiracy was income."

Eighteen doctors and the estates of two deceased doctors are appealing.
